GENERAL INTRODUCTION

BACKGROUND

Prairie College, legally incorporated as Prairie Bible Institute, is a leading Canadian, Christian post-secondary institution that integrates applied education, biblical literacy, and spiritual formation to equip students for addressing the world's greatest needs impacting society, church, and mission. Prairie opened its doors for the first time on October 9, 1922 with eight students meeting in a small farmhouse. The campus steadily expanded as more and more students began arriving, eager to learn from L. E. Maxwell and many other dedicated Bible teachers. For a century, Prairie has helped prepare thousands of alumni to become faithful servants of Jesus Christ, reaching out to people in more than 110 countries around the globe.

OUR MISSION

Prairie College's mission is to help establish God's Kingdom by equipping and mentoring individuals through biblically integrated education for life and careers that will meet the greatest needs of the world for the glory of God.

STATEMENT OF FAITH

The Scriptures

We believe the Old and New Testament Scriptures are divinely inspired, are entirely true and trustworthy, and constitute the only supreme authority in all matters of doctrine and conduct.

The Trinity

We believe there is one living and true God, eternally existing in three persons--Father, Son, and Holy Spirit--who are the same in essence and co-equal in power and glory.

Jesus Christ

We believe in the full deity and full humanity of our Lord Jesus Christ. We affirm his virgin birth, sinless life, divine miracles, atoning death as our substitute, bodily resurrection, ascension into heaven, ongoing work as our mediator, and personal return in power and glory.

The Holy Spirit

We believe in the Holy Spirit by whose regenerating power and ongoing ministry the believer is enabled to live a holy life and to witness and work for the Lord Jesus Christ.

Creation

We believe in the direct creative acts of God as recorded in Genesis.

Satan

We believe that Satan, a fallen angel along with other angelic beings, rebelled against God and was cast out of Heaven. Although he was defeated at the cross, he continues to be the archenemy of God, angels, and humanity. He will be judged and his final destiny will be the lake of fire.

Humanity and Sin

We believe humanity, male and female, was created in the image of God. In Adam all humankind fell into sin through disobedience to God, incurring both physical and spiritual death. All people are born with a sinful nature, are separated from God, are sinners in thought, word, and deed, and are in need of salvation.

Salvation

We believe the grace of God alone provides salvation from sin for all humanity only through personal faith in Jesus Christ alone and his all-sufficient atoning death on the cross and his victorious resurrection.

The Christian Life

We believe that Christians are to grow spiritually and stand firm against the spiritual forces of evil through submission to the Lordship of Christ, the knowledge of God's Word, the power of the indwelling Holy Spirit, and prayerful dependence on God. Scripture commands believers to love God and others and to live out their salvation with care for one another, compassion for the poor and needy, and justice for all. In obedience to Christ's commission, believers are to make disciples among all people.

The Church

We believe the Church, the Body of Christ, consists of all true believers, and with Christ as Head, she manifests herself in local churches to glorify him, edify believers, and evangelize spiritually lost humanity everywhere.

The Return of Jesus Christ

We believe in the literal, bodily return of the Lord Jesus Christ.

Future State of the Dead

We believe in the bodily resurrection of both believers and unbelievers, those who are believers to the resurrection of eternal life in the presence of God, and those who are unbelievers to the resurrection of eternal punishment separated from God.

OUR CORE VALUES

Four core values motivate what we do and what we teach. We are committed to integrating these values into all aspects of classroom and community life, in both academic and practical ways.

Christ Centred - Christ is the life-transforming centre of and reason for our learning community. We lovingly follow Him, under the guidance of the Holy Spirit, and gratefully depend on the Lord Almighty for all our needs.

Bible Based - The Bible is the God-breathed Truth through which He nourishes our community. We willingly obey it and submit our lives, community, and program to its authority.

Discipleship Directed - We are a faith community being discipled by one another as followers of Jesus. We diligently teach and eagerly learn His truth to be transformed together into His likeness.

Mission Mandated - God is on mission to bring redemption and reconciliation, sending His Church as ambassadors into the world. We actively respond through lives of servanthood and sacrifice to honour God and for the good of others.

EDUCATIONAL PRIORITIES

College life, both inside and outside the classroom, is a process of learning to love and follow Christ. This process requires relationships and life in community as well as the transmission, refinement, and preservation of values by means of reason, research, engagement with tradition, moral concern, reflection, and introspection. We want our education to foster a life-long commitment to the pursuit of truth, especially in its application to relationship with a holy God, meaning in life, justice in human relationships, Godgiven human dignity, and stewardship of creation.

This philosophy includes the following curricular priorities:

Biblical Literacy

The Bible is the foundation and authority of the learning experience. Learning its content, understanding its meaning, and being formed by its practices are indispensable for a Prairie education. Each program includes a significant number of biblical and theological credits. All four-year programs require the study of all 66 books of the Bible in no less than seven three credit-hour courses, and there are proportionate numbers of courses in shorter programs. The emphasis on biblical study, understanding, and practice will inform and influence the study of other subjects; similarly, the insights of other disciplines will inform the study of the biblical text.

Cultural Literacy

Additionally, the curriculum provides cultural literacy and understanding through academically rigorous humanities, social science, and science courses. These subjects are studied both for their own value as General Revelation and as complements to the study of Scripture. We approach them from a biblically grounded perspective, considering them to be a vital part of a holistic Christian education.

Vocational Training

The third curriculum component includes training in specific skills for various kinds of vocations. Affirming all vocations as places of God's kingdom work, Prairie will focus on applied education that equips students with knowledge and career skills by which they can serve the greatest needs of the world.

Christian Formation

Personal growth and maturity in the Christian life is one of the main guiding principles of our educational philosophy. This curriculum component takes the student's learning experience beyond that of mere skill development and training to relational growth in Christ towards God and neighbor.

ACCREDITATION AND TRANSFERABILITY

Prairie College is authorized to grant divinity degrees by the Province of Alberta. Prairie is registered as a Private Career College with the government of Alberta and therefore has eligibility for student loans.

Prairie College is accredited by the Association for Biblical Higher Education (ABHE). ABHE is an institution recognized by the Council for Higher Education Accreditation (CHEA) and the U.S. Department of Education. Contact information for ABHE: 5850 T. G. Practical Nursing education is delivered by an approved program through Bow Valley College and Red Deer Polytechnic and FMR/PCP by an approved program through Professional Medical Associates. Aviation is delivered under authority and scrutiny of Transport Canada as well as the education authority of the province of Alberta. Other associations, memberships, and affiliations are partnered with to provide appropriate credentialing of programs.

Alumni are able to continue their education at seminaries and other institutions of higher education. The Registrar's office has information about advanced credit partnerships available to Prairie students. Graduates have been accepted at such schools as Regent College, Tyndale Seminary, University of Toronto, University of Nottingham, Yale Divinity School, University of Chicago, Providence Seminary, and Trinity Evangelical Divinity School (Trinity International University). As in any educational context, the extent of transferable credit depends on factors such as grades achieved as well as the particular course of studies being pursued.

SPIRITUAL FORMATION

Prairie is deeply committed to Christian spiritual growth as a core outcome of the educational experience. This growth is centred in developing an authentic relationship with the Triune God and students are intentionally engaged in practices and priorities such as service, chapel, spiritual life events, small group, and congregational commitment that are designed to cultivate this transforming friendship with God. This discipleship integrates into and influences all Prairie experiences including classes in all disciplines, athletics, relationships, recreation, and residence. Learning to follow Jesus Christ is an irreplaceable requirement and privilege for every student in every program at Prairie.

The staff and students agree to journey together as we seek God within this Christ-centred learning community. This written agreement of how we live and work together is known as our Community Covenant. Every staff member and student must clearly understand and sincerely embrace the Community Covenant and its responsibilities for the community to live and work together harmoniously. Therefore, students are required to thoroughly read and then commit themselves to the Community Covenant prior to enrollment.

ONLINE EDUCATION

Prairie Online Education delivers courses through various technologies. Full degrees, that mirror the campus curriculum, are available in online format. Information on programs, courses, policies, and enrollment may be found at prairie.edu/online.

LIVING IN COMMUNITY

Prairie is an educational arm of the Church and exists for the equipping of men and women to fulfill the global mission of the church. Prairie desires that students develop attitudes and behaviours essential to living in unity with other believers in the global church.

Prairie seeks to foster unity between all genuine Christians. The College is intentionally and purposefully trans-denominational. The 20+ denominations represented in our student body include Christian and Missionary Alliance, Anglican, Baptist, Brethren, Evangelical Free, Lutheran, Mennonite, Methodist, Nazarene, and others. Members of the faculty and staff also represent a variety of denominations and fellowships. There is great diversity in the educational community.

Within the diversity of our campus community, we seek to maintain 'the unity of the body within the bond of peace.' We find our mutual centre in Jesus Christ and agreement in the great essential doctrines of the Bible as articulated in our statement of faith—for example,



the inspiration of the Scriptures, the vicarious death of Christ, and His bodily resurrection. We recognize that within an interdenominational college sincere Christians differ in their understanding of the Bible's teaching on secondary matters. In these areas we must keep the unity of the Spirit even though we may differ in our interpretations. In humility before God and one another, we live with the basic commitment of "in essentials unity, in non-essentials liberty, in all things charity." In the interest of unity, the College expects that staff and students will be respectful of those who hold different understandings of the Scriptures.

ADMISSIONS, FEES, AND FINANCIAL AID

ENTRANCE REQUIREMENTS

Within the context of our theological conviction and mission, it is Prairie's policy concerning the admission of students, not to discriminate on the basis of the applicant's colour, gender, or ethnic origin.

The Master of Leadership in Global Christian Education has its own entrance requirements. See its program page below.

Admission to Prairie is based on three criteria:

1. Personal Christian Life and Testimony (character)

An applicant's Christian life and testimony is disclosed by answering several questions on the application as well as by the information submitted through the Spiritual Reference form.

2. Academic Performance

Admission to Prairie requires students to obtain a high school diploma or equivalent and have a minimum final average of 60% in five senior (Grade 12) subjects, one of which must be English. The grade for English must be a minimum of 60%. If the applicant is not enrolled in five Grade 12 subjects, course marks from relevant Grade 11 subjects may be considered. Greater weight will be placed on marks in academic subjects (social studies and math, for example) than on marks in non-academic subjects.

Applicants who do not meet the academic requirements may submit a written request to have them waived on the basis of motivation and improved academic skills. An Admissions Committee composed of the Director of Admissions, the Registrar, and the Director of Student Development, will make a decision on the request.

Practical Nurse Students are also required to meet Red Deer Polytechnic entrance requirements. These include:

- Minimum final mark of 60% in English 30-1 or 70% in English 30-2 or equivalent
- Credit in Math 20-1 or a minimum final mark of 60% in Math 20-2 or equivalent.
- Minimum final mark of 60% in Biology 30 or equivalent.

3. English Language Proficiency

For applicants whose first language is English, proficiency is measured by Grade 12 course marks. Please see the information below on Thinking and Writing placement.

For applicants whose first language is not English, proficiency is measured by an approved English language testing service. See the International Students section below.

Thinking and Writing Placement

Students enrolled on most academic programs must take HF 111 Thinking and Writing in one of their first two full-time semesters unless they've fulfilled the requirement by some other means (e.g. transfer). Students must meet the English Placement Policy requirements in order to enroll in HF 111. For more information about the Placement Policy, please contact the Admissions Office.

Student Success Lab

Students who are judged by Admissions and Faculty to need additional academic assistance may be required to enroll in HF 094 Student Success Lab.

Canadian Students from Other Provinces

In most Canadian provinces, a grade 12 diploma is equivalent to the Alberta Secondary School Diploma. The exceptions are:

- Quebec: Successful completion of one year of CEGEP is required.
- Ontario: Old curriculum: Admission requires completion of the Ontario Secondary School Diploma at the grade 12 advanced

level with a minimum 60% combined average in six grade 12 courses including English. Those students who have completed OAC courses may be eligible for transfer credit for certain courses.

New curriculum: Admission requires completion of the Ontario Secondary School Diploma with a minimum 60% combined average in ENG4C or ENG4U "English" plus five other Grade 12 U or UC courses.

Students from the United States

Students graduating from Grade 12 in the United States of America are eligible to apply for admission to Prairie. Admission to Prairie programs requires a high school diploma or equivalent. A minimum of a "C" average is required. Although not required, students are encouraged to submit SAT or ACT scores to be considered for admission. Students in good standing at a college or university in the United States are also eligible to apply for admission and may receive transfer credits.

U.S. citizens studying in Canada are required to obtain a Study Permit. U.S. citizens do not need to apply at a Canadian Consulate; instead, they will obtain a Study Permit at the Canadian port of entry (border crossing or airport) when they enter. They should be prepared to present:

- 1. Their college acceptance letter;
- 2. Passport and an additional form of photo ID;
- 3. Proof of sufficient funds for one year (a bank cheque or statement [not a personal cheque], Prairie account receipt, or a letter from a sponsor on official letterhead stationery). Immigration Canada charges \$150.00 (subject to change) for Student Authorization documents at the border.

U.S. students are often permitted by Canadian Immigration policies to work on or off our campus during their time of studies. Students and spouses who seek employment during their stay at Prairie will need to notify the Canadian Immigration Officers at the border. They must make mention of this when obtaining their Study Permit. Please note that U.S. students must be enrolled in full-time studies (12 credits per semester) to be eligible to work on or off campus. Applicants who have any questions concerning this process should contact the Admissions Office at 1-800-661-2425.

International Students

Citizens of countries other than the United States or Canada should begin the application process several months before their first semester of enrollment. We suggest the following dates for application: before May 1 for the Fall Semester and before September 1 for the Winter Semester.

All international students should carefully assess their ability to meet the requirements and to keep the following important things in mind:

The Admissions Committee evaluates applications upon receipt of all application materials. An application for admission will not be considered complete until all required documents have been received (application, transcripts and references).

International students must submit proof of English proficiency by completing one of the following:

- The Test of English as a Foreign Language (TOEFL) with a minimum score of 90 on the internet based test with a minimum score of 21 points in each section.
- The academic level International English Language Testing Service (IELTS) exam with an overall band score of 6.5, with no band scores less than 6.0.
- Cambridge C1 Advanced (Certificate in Advanced English) or Cambridge C2 Proficiency (Certificate of Proficiency in English) with a score of at least 180.
- Duolingo English Test with a minimum score of 110.

Test scores must be valid and verifiable, and results must be issued directly from the testing office. Photocopies will not be accepted. Scores more than two years old will NOT be accepted. If you have completed an English Language Proficiency exam that is not one of the exams listed above, please contact the Admissions Department. Meeting these test scores does not guarantee admission to the College and additional testing may be required before admittance is granted.

You may check the English proficiency requirements for BVC's Practical Nurse program here.

International students are required to show proof to Canadian Immigration officials that funds are available to cover one year's fees (approximately \$18,800 Canadian, depending on program). This can be made up of student financial assistance (see above), the student's own contribution(s), and/or the contributions of their family/friends/sponsors. Application should be made to the Canadian Embassy or Consulate in their home country for a Student Visa. <u>Students must obtain a Student Visa prior to leaving their home country.</u> They will be required to show the Student Visa documents and proof of funds at the point of entry into Canada and also upon arrival at Prairie.

International students are often permitted by Canadian Immigration policies to work on or off our campus during their time of studies. Please note that International students must be enrolled in full-time studies (12 credits per semester) to be eligible to work on or off campus.

Applicants who have any questions concerning the admissions process should contact our International Students Admissions Counselor.

Home-based Learners

Prairie welcomes applications from home-based learners. Applicants who are unable to provide provincially/state-examined senior course results are evaluated individually in order to determine their preparedness for post-secondary studies. Home-based learners must be at least 17 years of age in September. Please contact the Admissions Office for additional details.

Letter of Permission (Visiting) Students

From time to time students who are currently enrolled at other post-secondary institutions express a desire to include Prairie College as a part of their post-secondary educational plans. These students would like their degree to come from their "home" institution but would like to take courses at Prairie to transfer back to their program. The following guidelines are applied to such students:

- 1. Letter of Permission students go through a simplified application for admission process. This consists of:
 - a. An application form;
 - b. Applicable application fees;
 - c. A letter of permission from the school to which credits are being transferred (includes the student's GPA, the courses they are permitted to take and a list of required prerequisites they have completed, if applicable);
 - d. A reference form to be filled out by a pastor or church leader. This requirement may be waived for students who are currently enrolled at another Christian post-secondary institution.
- 2. Letter of Permission students are permitted to complete up to nine courses. If they desire to pursue further courses beyond these nine, the regular application process must be completed and the student must be formally admitted into a Prairie program.
- 3. Students may take a maximum of five courses per semester on a Letter of Permission. Students should be aware that they are not eligible to receive a degree or certificate from Prairie College unless the officially transfer.

Students are required to complete a transcript request form (available from the Registrar's Office) near the end of the semester in order to finalize the official transfer of grades to their "home institutions".

Mature Student Status

A limited number of mature students (aged 21 or older) may be allowed to enroll with less than the standard academic requirement. Individuals who do not meet the regular admission standards may be considered for mature student admission based on an examination of their abilities, educational background, professional and ministry experience.

Fraudulent Documents

Applicants who submit fraudulent documents for admission or make false statements on their application will have their application denied. Discovery of fraudulent documents or false statements after acceptance will be a basis for Academic Suspension or Conduct Suspension respectively.



APPLICATION PROCEDURE

Applicants must submit completed application forms to the Admissions Office. The application package can be found here. Applicants are expected to complete all forms and follow all instructions given at this URL. STUDENT FINANCES

Tuition and Fees

Prairie does everything possible to make the cost of attendance affordable. As an accredited, private, post-secondary college in Alberta, Prairie receives no direct funding from the government. Student fees make up a portion of our income but the remainder comes from many gracious donors who believe so strongly in what Prairie's education accomplishes that they assist students by giving to the College.

Tuition Deposit

For new students, a tuition deposit of \$250 is due by May 1 and is non-refundable after this date. Payment indicates the student's intention of attending Prairie and reserves a place at Prairie for the student in the Fall.

Payment of Fees

Students who have paid their tuition deposit may register for classes. New student registration begins in late June or early July for the Fall semester and October for the Winter Semester. (Registration consists of selecting courses.)

Students must have a minimum of \$2,000 deposited to their student accounts at the beginning of each semester. This deposit is mandatory and students who do not pay this will not have access to dorms, meals or access to classes. Full payment of each semester is required by the start of second term each semester.

Any changes to credit load, residence status, meal plan, and fees may alter the owing balance on a student's account.

Prairie accepts cash, cheque, Interac/debit cards, Visa, MasterCard (a 3% fee is charged on all credit card transactions), e-transfer, online banking system, and Flywire as forms of payment. Please contact Student Financial Services for details.

Unpaid Balances

Students who have unpaid balances at the end of any semester will not be permitted to begin the next semester. Students with unpaid balances will not receive transcripts or graduation documents before the outstanding amount is paid.

Late Arrival

New students are not allowed to arrive after the start date for the semester.

Early Arrival

Students may not live in the residences more than one day prior to the beginning of a semester without first receiving permission from a Director of Student Development. A daily fee is charged for those who arrive more than one day before Registration Day. International students should consult Admissions.

Withdrawals

Students who withdraw or are dismissed from Prairie after completing registration will be granted refunds as outlined below.

Tuition Fee Refunds

Semester long and Term courses: Please refer to the Academic Guide and the Add/Drop Dates on the Academic Calendar here.

International students: Where an international student's tuition fees, or any portions thereof, are to be refunded in accordance with Prairie's refund policy, they are refunded to the student if the student paid the whole of the fees. If other individuals or organizations paid part of the fees, the refund is divided among the student and the other individuals and organizations in proportion to the percentage of the fees paid by each.

Room and Board Refunds

Moving out of the dorm is not approved in the middle of a term. Should an eligible student move out during term break they will receive a 50% refund for the second term's residence fees. Eligible students who move out over the Christmas break will not incur any penalty. Students who do not follow the proper withdrawal procedure are charged an additional fee. Calculation of refunds depends upon the date that Financial Services receives a properly completed and signed withdrawal form.

Medical Coverage

Students must have medical insurance coverage while studying at Prairie. They should bring their provincial health care card with them. (Students from other Canadian provinces are not required to apply for Alberta Health Insurance unless moving permanently to Alberta).

All international students are required to have health insurance. Those whose Student Permit/Visa is valid for more than one calendar year will qualify for free health insurance through Alberta Health. Those whose Student Permit/Visa is valid for less than one calendar year will need to purchase travel insurance.

Both Alberta Health Insurance and travel insurance are available at Adam B. Young Insurance, 416 Main St., Three Hills.

FINANCIAL ASSISTANCE, SCHOLARSHIPS, BURSARIES, AND EMPLOYMENT

Employment Opportunities

In addition to employment opportunities in the Three Hills community, Prairie offers a limited number of jobs and leadership positions. Most of these range from 5-15 hours per week and some pay an hourly wage while others are Student Applied Leadership Training (SALT) positions (see below).

Spousal Discount

Married couples who have both spouses enrolled in courses may qualify for the Spousal Discount. If one spouse is enrolled as a full-time student (12 or more credit hours), the other spouse may receive 50% off tuition fees. If both are enrolled full-time, the spouse enrolled for the lesser number of credit hours receives the discount. Audited courses are not covered.

Family Discount

Families who have more than one family member at Prairie College may qualify for the Sibling Discount. The first two family members receive 10% off their tuition fees. Three or more students enrolled from the same household receive 20% off their tuition fees. All other fees are payable in full.

Student Loans

Student loan information is obtainable in the Financial Aid Information Package, which is available from the Student Financial Aid Office or online here. Applications for student loans usually require 6 - 8 weeks to process.

Aviation students should note that student loans are not available for a Private Pilot License.

PCP students should note that student loans are not available for the PCP program.

Student Applied Leadership Training (SALT)

Second, third and fourth year students may be eligible for the Student Applied Leadership Training (SALT) program, which provides a bursary that is equivalent to a single dorm room accommodation. (Students are eligible for SALT positions once they have completed 24 credits towards their program.) For more information, please visit here.

Scholarships

Prairie awards more than \$500,000 in financial aid to students each year. Scholarships are awarded in amounts varying from \$250 to \$2,000. The total amount of Prairie Financial Aid awarded cannot exceed the student's tuition fees.

ACADEMIC PROGRAMS

MASTERS OF LEADERSHIP IN GLOBAL CHRISTIAN EDUCATION

A Two Year Graduate Program (36 Credits)

Program Director: Sandra Paetkau

This a synchronous online program. Cohorts begin each January.

Capstone:

Throughout the program students will work on a Capstone project that integrates what they are learning throughout their courses. Students will be asked to identify an issue in their educational environment and will develop a plan to address it.

Practicum:

Students will be placed in an international educational environment. Students will complete a 2-3 week practicum to include either student teaching, staff training, co-develop an education as mission's project with host school leadership team, or other practical application of students' research.

Admissions Requirements:

Applicants should have an undergraduate degree from a recognized college or university and have achieved a cumulative G.P.A. of 2.7 on a four-point scale.

All applicants will be asked to provide the following:

- An academic reference and a pastoral/Christian life reference
- Official transcripts
- A personal testimony
- A video submission detailing your educational experience and interest in this program

Applicants whose undergraduate degree was not in English must also display English proficiency. They may do so in one of the following ways:

- Recommended: The academic level International English Language Testing Service (IELTS) exam with an overall band score of 6.5, with no band scores less than 6.0.
- The Test of English as a Foreign Language (TOEFL) with a minimum score of 90 on the internet based test with a minimum score of 21 points in each section.
- Cambridge C1 Advanced (Certificate in Advanced English) or Cambridge C2 Proficiency (Certificate of Proficiency in English) with a score of at least 180.

Bible Literacy Component:

Prairie is committed to having all graduates achieve a level of Biblical Literacy which equips them for future ministry. To this end, each student will need to complete a total of 9 Bible credits at a recognized post-secondary institution.* These courses can be completed online at Prairie College at a discounted rate of 33% either prior to or during the student's course of study. Completing this requirement also ensures that students will qualify for the ACSI Principal Certification. Students may meet this requirement through courses taken at another institution at the discretion of the Registrar's Office.

Through a partnership with Carey Theological College, this program leads to a Bachelor of Arts in Ministry/Pastoral from Prairie and a Master of Divinity from Carey. Students take three years of undergraduate courses at Prairie (96 credits) and two years of graduate courses at Carey (48 credits).

Prairie College transfers 24 credits from the completed graduate program into the undergraduate degree; Carey gives transfer credit and/or advanced standing from the completed undergraduate years into the graduate degree.

Admitted applicants will be exempted from three courses on the list below, thus bringing the degree down to 90 credits.

Through combined Bible courses and flight training, the AAMA program provides students with the skills and experience they need to serve God whether flying for a mission organization in a developing country or piloting an airliner across North America.

AAMA students will:

- Complete approximately 240 hours of professional flight training in tail wheel, tricycle, and complex aircraft, with an additional 45 hours in our flight simulator.

- It is required that students obtain a Category 1 Transport Canada aviation medical certificate before enrolling in the AAMA program.
- Students need to achieve a minimum 2.7 cumulative grade point average (g.p.a.) in at least 12 credits of non-AV courses before beginning their first AV course (transfer students must achieve an equivalent combined cumulative g.p.a. of 2.7 on a minimum total of 12 credits of transferred courses and PC non-AV courses).
- Students who do not meet the requirements for unconditional admission may appeal to the Director of the Prairie Aviation Training Centre.
- When students begin flight training at Prairie Aviation Training Centre, they are required to deposit \$11,000 into their flight account at the beginning of each term (approximately every eight weeks).

DIPLOMA IN MINISTRY/PRACTICAL NURSING

A Two Year Undergraduate Program (61 Credits)

Red Deer Polytechnic, Interim Program Chair: Rachel Burwell

This double-diploma program provides foundational training in Bible and theology combined with the Practical Nurse program offered through Red Deer Polytechnic (RDP). All courses are taught on Prairie College's campus in Three Hills. The Diploma in Ministry is awarded by Prairie College; the PN diploma is awarded by RDP.

Facilities include two full clinical labs and a simulator lab. The program uses its own high fidelity simulator, which gives learners the opportunity to apply knowledge and perform skills related to critical components in a safe learning environment. Within our lab area there are 16 beds set up to simulate an acute care hospital setting. Students are able to practice skills using manikins for catheterization, tracheostomy care, wound care, nasogastric tubes, and many more procedures. Use of IV pumps, tube-feeding pumps, as well as suction gives students hands-on experience with equipment that they will operate while in clinical or when they graduate. Students will practice injection skills on injection pads and when learning to initiate an intravenous will practice on an IV arm that simulates veins.

Non-Academic Post-Acceptance Requirements:

- Up-to-date immunizations required. For detailed information please review the immunization requirements here.
- Minimum of 18 years of age.
- CPR Healthcare Provider Level Certificate. This must be the course provided by the Heart and Stroke Foundation and it must be updated every 12 months. It is available for students at the beginning of the fall semester.
- Police Information Check (PIC) with a Vulnerable Sector Search. PICs are valid for the duration of the PN Program, however, students are responsible to inform faculty of any changes to their PICs during the PN program. The PIC must be dated no earlier than ninety (90) days prior to the start of the PN Program.
- The Practical Nurse program is very demanding and requires that you have the mental and physical stamina to: work shifts and weekends; be on your feet for extended periods of time; use your knees, back and arms to move clients who have minimal strength; function effectively in stressful situations; work unassisted to perform skills.
- Students should ensure that they have a laptop computer that is compatible with the Respondus LockDown browser. This browser is only compatible with Windows and Mac computers and Apple iPads. It is not compatible with smartphones, Chromebooks, or Android tablets. For more information on this browser, click here.

Fall Semester: September – December Winter Semester: January – April Spring Semester: May – July/August

CERTIFICATE IN OUTDOOR LEADERSHIP ('EXPLORE')

Program Director: Dennis Landon

A One Year Undergraduate Program (30 Credits)

Gives students foundational training in biblical studies and leadership formation combined with hands-on education in a wilderness setting. The Explore program schedule is divided between time on Prairie's campus and at Frontier Lodge in Nordegg, Alberta. Wilderness technical skills include whitewater rafting, kayaking, rock climbing, backpacking, challenge course facilitation, basic mountaineering, winter camping, and backcountry skiing. Additional training includes trip leading, wilderness first aid, CPR, orienteering, wilderness survival, snowshoeing, avalanche awareness, and search and rescue.

Explore Fitness Guidelines:

In order for a student to have a positive experience in Explore's many adventure activities, we have physical fitness guidelines. Upon arrival, students should be able to carry a 40 lb. pack for 5 kilometres in under an hour. Additionally, students should also be able to swim 200 meters non-stop.

Program Outcomes:

- Explain basic positional and non-positional leadership theory and practice its application.
- Express principles of experiential education and practice in controlled applications.

AS ARTS AND SCIENCES

AS 400 INTEGRATIVE SEMINAR

3 credits

The purpose of this seminar is to aid students in the process of bringing faith, learning, vocation, and ministry into a coherent way of life. Any understanding of such a life is always worked out in reference to the vital questions and concerns of our cultural moment, as well as the enduring, universal questions faced by each successive generation. Students will study a range of cultural theologies from a variety of vocational perspectives and then present their own theological findings on a topic pertinent to their vocational future. *Prerequisite: Minimum 80 credits of post-secondary study*

AV AVIATION

Aviation Ground Schools cannot be audited unless previously taken and passed. Aviation Flight Practicums cannot be audited.

AV 100 PRIVATE PILOT LICENSE GROUND SCHOOL

3 credits

This ground school covers the Transport Canada academic requirements for the Canadian Private Pilot License. Sections include General Knowledge, Meteorology, Navigation, and Air law.

Prerequisites: Consent of Prairie Aviation Training Centre, enrollment in SC 160 Meteorology

AV 123 FLIGHT PRACTICUM: PRIVATE PILOT LICENSE I

3 credits

Students will learn the foundational concepts of aircraft control, together with their practical application to all normal phases of flight and abnormal situations. Students will learn pilot decision making techniques, and gain experience in risk management through the practical application of human factors in aviation.

Prerequisites: enrolment in AV 100 Private Pilot Ground School, a 2.7 cumulative g.p.a. in previous non-AV courses, Class 3 medical (Class 1 preferred)

Corequisite: AV 124 Flight Practicum: Private Pilot License II

AV 124 FLIGHT PRACTICUM: PRIVATE PILOT LICENSE II

3 credits

Students will learn the foundational concepts of aircraft control, together with their practical application to all normal phases of flight and abnormal situations. Students will learn pilot decision making techniques, and gain experience in risk management through the practical application of human factors in aviation.

Prerequisite: AV 123 Flight Practicum: Private Pilot License I, 2.7 cumulative g.p.a. in previous non-AV courses, Class 3 medical (Class 1 preferred)

Corequisite: AV 123 Flight Practicum: Private Pilot License I

AV 130 FLIGHT PRACTICUM: INITIAL TIME AND EXPERIENCE

2.5 credits

In this module, Class C Airspace experience is expanded along with the management and use of radio navigation equipment. Unimproved airstrip procedures will continue to be developed through operations on grass runways. Students continue the development of their pilotage skills as they gain significant cross-country PiC experience.

Prerequisites: AV 124 Flight Practicum: Private Pilot License II

AV 131 FLIGHT PRACTICUM: AIRCRAFT TYPE CONVERSION

1.5 credits

In this module, students will transition from tricycle landing gear aircraft to an aircraft with conventional tailwheel landing gear. Training commences with a short ground school course on the operational differences between tricycle and conventional gear aircraft, aircraft systems and company type Standard Operating Procedures. Low-level navigational skills will be developed along with the building of PiC cross-country time.

Prerequisite: AV 124 Flight Practicum: Private Pilot License II

AV 132 FLIGHT PRACTICUM: COMPLEX AIRCRAFT TYPE CONVERSION

1 credit

In this module, students will transition to a single-engine aircraft with retractable gear and constant speed propeller. Training commences with a short ground school course on the operational requirements and complexities of retractable gear and constant speed propeller, aircraft systems and company type Standard Operating Procedures. Students will learn to manage the higher speeds and correct procedures for operating a constant speed propeller and retractable landing gear.

Prerequisites: AV 130 Flight Practicum: Initial Time and Experience

AV 133 FLIGHT PRACTICUM: MOUNTAIN FLYING

.5 credits

In this module, students are introduced to the challenges of mountain flying. Training commences with a short ground school course on mountain weather, illusions, and navigation. Classroom instruction also covers advanced concepts for operations from unprepared surfaces including slope and adverse wind. Students will learn to safely navigate through valleys, negotiate ridge crossings, and compensate for unpredictatable winds and mountain specific visual illusions.

Prerequisite: AV 132 Flight Practicum: Complex Aircraft Conversion

AV 201 IFR GROUND SCHOOL

3 credits

This course is offered to ensure students have the practical and theoretical knowledge to operate aircraft in the Canadian IFR environment. Students will be prepared to write the Transport Canada Instrument Flight Rules written exam (INRAT) successfully. Prerequisites: AV 207 Aircraft Systems for Pilots and AV 208 Commercial Pilot Ground School, passing grade on CPAER, and 70% final grade in previous Ground School

AV 207 AIRCRAFT SYSTEMS FOR PILOTS

3 credits

This course is designed to familiarize the student with the principles and workings of the various systems found in an aircraft. Classroom sessions cover the theory of operations of these systems, and hangar sessions will involve demonstrations and hands-on projects to aid in understanding the principles and techniques involved. Students will have a greater understanding of how to intelligently operate an aircraft, troubleshoot problems, and accurately describe what may be malfunctioning.

Prerequisites: AV 100 Private Pilot Ground School, passing grade on PPAER, SC 160 Meteorology, 70% final grade in previous Ground School

AV 208 COMMERCIAL PILOT LICENSE GROUND SCHOOL

3 credite

CPL Ground School is intended to build on the knowledge and skills gained training toward the Private Pilot Licence. In order to operate aircraft in the commercial environment, pilots must master information from a variety of topic areas including Air Law, Radio Navigation, Meteorology and Aeronautics. Students gain a working knowledge of aircraft operations in a commercial setting. This will include Air Law applied to commercial carriers, complex loading and weight & balance problems and performance calculations for aircraft of 12,500 lbs. or less. Students will also become familiar with radio navigation systems, using ADF, VOR and GPS receivers, and the use of Low Level Enroute Charts.

Prerequisites: AV 100 Private Pilot Ground School, SC 160 Meteorology, and 70% final grade in previous ground school, Class 1 medical

AV 209 INTRODUCTION TO COCKPIT RESOURCE MANAGEMENT

1.5 credits

The student will gain an understanding of the physiological, psychological, sociological and ergonomically based relationships that affect ones decision-making process. Students will learn to apply these concepts in practical risk assessment, threat and error management situations. In addition, students will learn how these concepts affect multi-crew cockpits, and how to apply this knowledge to effective crew resource management.

AV 210 INTRODUCTION TO FLIGHT LINE OPERATIONS

1.5 credits

The student will gain knowledge and experience in non-flying skills that are an integral part of commercial aircraft operations. This includes refueling, ground maneuvering, cleaning and marshalling. In addition students will learn how to plan, load and secure complex, mixed loads of passengers and cargo, keeping the aircraft within weight and balance limitations. The student will receive certifications in basic first aid and dangerous goods awareness (aviation).

AV 230 FLIGHT PRACTICUM: NIGHT RATING

1.5 credits

In this module, the focus is on the completion of Transport Canada's night rating requirements. Training commences with a short ground school course on the differences between day and night flight operations. Training emphasizes instrument navigation, human factors, and instrument flying.

Prerequisite: AV 130 Flight Practicum: Initial Time and Experience

AV 231 FLIGHT PRACTICUM: COMMERCIAL PILOT LICENSE FLIGHT TEST PREPARATION

credit

In this module, students increase precision and confidence in operations and manoeuvers applicable to the Commercial Pilot License. *Prerequisites: AV 132 Flight Practicum: Complex Aircraft Conversion, passing grade in CPAER, 135 hours total time*

AV 234 FLIGHT PRACTICUM: UPSET PREVENTION AND RECOVERY TRAINING

0.5 credits

In this module, training is designed to further mature manual aircraft control and situational awareness skills developed during training through CPL standards, and designed to raise awareness of the potential dangers of entering an upset without a proper understanding of how to recover. Students gain advanced knowledge and skills so in the unlikely event of an actual emergency they are better prepared to respond correctly. Training concentrates on all-attitude, time-critical, counter-intuitive recognition and recovery skills. Basic aerobatic maneuvers are used to foster a more complete understanding of the accumulation and dissipation of aircraft energy. Students explore the operational envelope of the aircraft and energy management of the aircraft through basic aerobatic maneuvers. Training includes short ground sessions prior to each flight.

Prerequisite: AV 131 Flight Practicum: Aircraft Type Conversion

AV 235 FLIGHT PRACTICUM: MULTI ENGINE INSTRUMENT RATING

2.5 credit

In this module, students receive training toward completion of the Group 1 (multi-engine) Instrument Rating. Students gain experience and become proficient in ATC radio communications and clearances, operations of EFIS and EFB, entry and flight of holding patterns, competent and safe execution of IFR approaches and missed approaches (NDB, VOR, ILS, DME arc, GNSS-LNAV/LPV). Students also gain experience and become proficient in handling in-flight emergencies during IFR flight.

Prerequisite: AV 201 Instrument Rating Ground School, AV 132 Flight Practicum: Complex Aircraft Type Conversion, and enrollment in AV 236 Flight Practicum: Multi-Engine Rating

AV 236 FLIGHT PRACTICUM: MULTI ENGINE RATING

1.5 credits

In this module, training is an extension of the Complex module, where students transition to a twin engine aircraft. Training commences with a ground school course on twin engine aerodynamics, particularly in relation engine power loss and VMCA. Classroom instruction also covers twin engine aircraft systems and company type Standard Operating Procedures. Students gain competence in a low-wing, higher speed, complex twin-engine aircraft through all phases of flight under normal and abnormal conditions. This includes experience with higher approach and landing speeds into runways with limited margins.

Prerequisites: AV 132 Flight Practicum: Complex Aircraft Conversion, 150 hours total time

AV 237 FLIGHT PRACTICUM: ADVANCED TIME AND EXPERIENCE

2.5 credits

In this module, students gain expanded experience in cross-country navigation through flights over longer distances, including cross-border operations, as possible. Students gain further experience in instrument flight and the use of radio navigation aids.

Prerequisite: AV 130 Flight Practicum: Initial Time and Experience, AV 131 Flight Practicum: Aircraft Type Conversion (preferred), AV 230: Flight Practicum: Night Rating (preferred)

AV 312 FLIGHT INSTRUCTOR RATING GROUND SCHOOL

3 credits

Completed with AV 333, this ground school covers the Transport Canada academic requirements for a commercial pilot seeking to become a flight instructor or a flight instructor wishing to renew an expired flight instructor rating.

Prerequisites: Transport Canada CPL and enrollment in AV 333 Flight Practicum: Instructor

AV 333 FLIGHT PRACTICUM: FLIGHT INSTRUCTOR RATING

3 credits

Completed with AV 312, students will complete a minimum of 30 hours flight training required for the Class 4 Instructor Rating. *Prerequisites: Transport Canada CPL, enrolment in AV 312 Flight Instructor Ground School*

BT BIBLE AND THEOLOGY

BT 3xx and 4xx BIBLE/THEOLOGY ELECTIVES

3 credits

Various electives will be offered, focusing on books, methods, or genres.

Prerequisite: for BT 3xx, one 200-level NT/OT/TH course; for BT 4xx, one NT/OT/TH 300-level course

BT 393 ISRAEL STUDY TOUR: HISTORICAL GEOGRAPHY OF THE BIBLE

3 credits

This trip will be a Dan to Beersheba (covering Israel from the North to the South) experience. It will highlight both Old and New Testament sites, Israeli and Palestinian locations. Walk the land of the Bible, hearing about the history, geography and archaeology of each site from an expert guide and Prairie College professors. Another feature of this trip is that each participant will be coached in the art of biblical storytelling. Eighty percent of the world prefers to learn spiritual truth by listening to stories so this is a valuable skill to have. Each participant learns a story(ies) and then get to share their story with the group on the site where the event actually happened. **Note:** Additional travel fees apply.

BT 402 BIBLE/THEOLOGY PRACTICUM

3 credits

This course provides experiential learning in a vocational-related area of biblical and theological studies. Usually involves research and teaching done in an academic, church, or church-related setting. Supervision provided by experienced on-site personnel and a member of Prairie's faculty

Notes: 1) Bachelor of Theology students only; 2) Requires 3.5 cumulative GPA; 3) Requires instructor's permission.

BT 403 BIBLE/THEOLOGY DIRECTED STUDY

3 credits

Working under the supervision of the instructor, each student designs and carries out research on a pre-approved topic. This work is the basis for a major research paper in BT 406.

Notes: 1) Bachelor of Theology students only; 2) Requires a minimum 3.5 cumulative GPA; 3) Requires instructor's permission; 4) Additional tuition fee equal to .5 credit.

BT 406 BIBLE/THEOLOGY RESEARCH PAPER

3 credits

Working under the supervision of the instructor, each student writes a 30-40 page undergraduate thesis on a pre-approved topic. *Prerequisite: BT 403 Bible/Theology Directed Study*

Notes: 1) Bachelor of Theology students only; 2) Requires a minimum 3.5 cumulative GPA; 3) Requires instructor's permission; 4) Additional tuition fee equal to .5 credit.

BT 409 WORD AND WORLD: THEOLOGY AND PRAXIS

3 credits

This course focuses on helping students bring the living Word of God to the world and the church in effective and creative ways. A significant aspect of the course is to address important issues in biblical, historical, and theological exegesis. In addition, the course also helps students develop a broad theological and practical framework for the ministry of the Word of God within the modern world and the life of the church.

Prerequisite: one of NT 221 Reading Paul's Letters, NT 351 Reading Hebrews to Revelation, OT 221 Reading the Historical Books, OT 343 Reading the Psalms and Wisdom Literature, TH 210 The God of the Gospel

BT 501 BIBLICAL THEOLOGY IN GLOBAL CONTEXTS

3 credits

In this course, we will focus now on how we coach and empower others to do the same. We will explore what instructional coaching is, our role as leaders as instructional coaches, culturally proficient coaching, and why/how to establish a culture of coaching.

BU BUSINESS

BU 105 ORGANIZATIONAL HEALTH AND PERFORMANCE

3 credits

This class explores the dynamics and principles that affect the health of an organization which in turn affect its performance. Students will learn about how organizations are like the human beings that form and sustain them, even having moral and personality traits. They will also study how the organization influences people. The course will present a philosophical and Biblically moral basis for creating healthy and high-performing organizations where people can flourish. The class will also examine the role of leadership in shaping healthy organizations.

BU 111 FINANCIAL ACCOUNTING

3 credits

This class covers the fundamentals of financial accounting. The class starts with helping students gain a solid foundation in understanding the construction, purposes, limitations and analysis of financial statements. We then use this financial knowledge to evaluate the performance of a business and to guide decision making to further that business' goals. In short, the goal is to become intelligent users of financial information.

BU 220 SALES AND MARKETING

3 credits

This course examines the creation, communication and delivery of value. The course approaches marketing as an organizational philosophy that should be integrated into every aspect of the business. The course will cover the traditional and fundamental frameworks and theories of marketing but will also discuss, in depth, the implications of Scriptural principles on the discipline of marketing. The course will explore how to create, communicate and deliver real value for those that the Kingdom-minded business seeks to serve.

Note: Offered on alternate years.

BU 235 BUSINESS ECONOMICS

3 credits

This course examines the principles of economics: the concepts and processes involved in the social exchange of value. It will encompass concepts and manifestations of economic development, philosophy, Socialism, Communism, and Capitalism. It will explore experientially the aspects of economic policy in regards to control and freedom. The emphasis is placed on the student's practical understanding of economics.

Note: Offered on alternate years.

BU 316 FINANCIAL MANAGEMENT

3 credits

The goal of this course is to help students develop the ability to use corporate finance theory and tools to make financial decisions in a business context. Building upon the knowledge developed in BU 111 Financial Accounting, this course will examine the financial decisions that need to be made in almost every business. Students will gain the tools and framework necessary to evaluate the decisions within a financial framework as well as include analyze non-financial factors that must be included if good (holistically-speaking) decisions are to be made.

Prerequisite: BU 111 Financial Accounting

Note: Offered on alternate years.

BU 350 GOVERNANCE AND LAW

2 credits

This course is intended to provide students with the basic legal principles and frameworks that are necessary for operating within a business context. The course will introduce students to the fundamental building blocks of business law. The course is designed to equip students with the necessary knowledge so that they are more aware of the legal implications of business actions and can more easily navigate the Canadian legal system. The class will also take time to discuss considerations of doing business in non-Canadian legal systems.

Note: offered on alternate years.

BU 360 THEOLOGY OF BUSINESS

3 credits

While all other classes will examine aspects of what is means to be a Disciple of Christ in business, this class will spend concentrated time on deeply engaging that question. The class will start with an examination of the role of commerce in society and then will explore what commerce would look like should "God's will be done in business" as it is in heaven. The course will spend time looking at the Biblical perspectives on an individual's work and the role of business in participating in the redemptive work of God in this world. This class is intended to help students develop a robust and Scripturally-grounded theology from which to engage their life of work.

Note: Offered on alternate years.

BU 430 BUSINESS PROJECT MANAGEMENT

1.5 credits

This one-and-a-half credit class is designed to introduce students to the world of Project Management. Key project management concepts will be learned and applied to several theoretical cases and at least one actual project, from start to finish. Students will learn to apply at least one software tool to the project management process.

BU 443 MISSIONAL ENTREPRENEURSHIP AND STRATEGY

3 credits

This class serves as the capstone course and experience for all business majors at Prairie. The particular focus of the class is on executing a strongly missional approach in business through strategy and entrepreneurship. The course will also, however, give students a chance to integrate much of their education throughout their degree into this class. The course (and program) finishes with students developing and presenting a business plan to potential funders.

Prerequisite: SS 261 Leadership Foundations

CF CHRISTIAN FORMATION

CF 141, 142, 241, 242, 341, 342 READINGS FOR CHRISTIAN FORMATION

1 credit/year

This pass/fail course is a weekly reading group for discussing works related to Christian Formation. We will critically discuss perspectives, insights, and issues arising from the texts we read, pursuing our own formation as disciples of Jesus and our formation together as brothers and sisters in Christ. This course is required for as long as a student is in the Christian Formation diploma or degree program, up to a maximum of three years. Those at Frontier Lodge will join the course in Fall Term 2, but will receive full credit at the end of the year.

Notes: 1) Audits require instructor approval; 2) Bachelor of Arts in Ministry/Christian Formation and Counselling or Diploma in Christian Formation students only.

CF 212 INTRODUCTION TO EVANGELICAL SPIRITUAL THEOLOGY

3 credits

Spiritual theology focuses on the theology of spiritual transformation, growth and the life of Christian communion with God. In a way, spiritual theology is at the heart of Christian theology and it integrates theology with the spiritual practice of living the resurrection life in Christ by the Spirit. This course provides an introductory overview of the biblical, historical and systematic aspects of spiritual theology from an evangelical (i.e., gospel-centred) perspective. In addition, students will also engage in some of the practical, relational, and habitual aspects of Christian formation.

Prerequisite: ST 100 The Christian Life or ST 103 Discernment and Discipleship

Note: Can be substituted for a Bible/Theology elective.

CF 231 PRAYER, COMMUNITY, AND CREATION

3 credits

A tech-free course conducted at Frontier Lodge in conjunction with two outdoor leadership courses and facilitated by Frontier Lodge staff, Explore instructors and interns. Personal prayer, readings and journaling are interwoven with group prayer and adventure-based learning outings designed to develop foundational virtues and practices of Christian spiritual growth. Location is Frontier Lodge.

Prerequisite: one of ST 100 The Christian Life, ST 103 Discernment and Discipleship

Notes: 1) Additional fee: \$900; 2) Offered on demand.

CF 290 DIRECTED STUDY

1 credit

Replaces 1 or 2 credits of CF 241-42/341-42 Readings in Christian Formation. Students design and carry out research on an aspect of Christian formation (2 credits) or read and critique one or more key Christian spiritual writings approved by the instructor (1 or 2 credits).

CF 418 THEOLOGY AND PSYCHOLOGY

3 credits

A biblical and historical survey seeking a theological basis for reframing a fully human psychology. Application will be made to specific areas such as trauma, addiction, and personality disorders.

Prerequisite: CF 212 Introduction to Evangelical Spiritual Formation

CF 430 THEORY AND PRACTICE OF SPIRITUAL DIRECTION

3 credits

This course prepares students to offer spiritual direction to others by exploring the history, theology, and practical dynamics of the direction process. Christian Formation and Counselling students who successfully complete this course may enroll in CM 479 Practicum in Spiritual Direction under the supervision of Urban Sanctuary as part of the Level 1 Spiritual Direction Certification track.

Prerequisite: CF 212 Introduction to Evangelical Spiritual Theology

Notes: 1) Can be substituted for a Bible/Theology elective; 2) Cohort-based, Online Education course.

CM CHURCH AND MINISTRY

CM 250 INTRODUCTION TO COUNSELLING

3 credits

Provides an introduction to the theoretical and practical foundation of interpersonal helping skills in the context of Christian ministry. Through active involvement the student will experience the basic process of helping others identify personal problems, set goals and move forward in their lives. Students will learn to recognize their role and what they bring into the helping relationship as a "skilled helper."

Prerequisite: SS 210 Introduction to Psychology

Note: No auditing.

CM 262 CULTURAL IMMERSION PRACTICUM

3 credits

This class is an immersion experience into an international and missional business. This experiential class places the student into a new culture, business, and missions context. The minimum duration for the class is four weeks and is designed to prepare the student for a longer-term, successful internship later on in their degree.

Note: Bachelor of Divinity in Business Administration students only.

CM 290/390/490 DIRECTED STUDY

2 or 3 credits

Guided independent study in which students design and carry out research or a project of their own choosing. Requirements will be set in accordance with the nature of the research or project which must be approved by a faculty supervisor, the Dean, and the Registrar. *Prerequisite: Consent of Supervisor, cumulative g.p.a. of at least 2.3, not on Academic Probation.*

CM 365-66 CROSS-CULTURAL INTERNSHIP

12 credits

The GlobeTREK internship is an 8-month immersion in other cultures, engaging in a number of formal and informal learning activities. For two months, students travel as a team and visit numerous different ministries, agencies and nations. For 6 months in the middle of the journey the student is involved in a ministry of their choice in a nation of their choice—for example, teaching ESL, working with orphans, teaching in a village school, teaching computer skills at a local radio station, working with local or international youth or children in a church, or working in a refugee camp are some of the possibilities. Expatriate mentors (preferably Canadians) and local supervisors will guide the student in their learning and practical experiences.

Note: Available only on the field during the GlobeTREK year in Bachelor of Arts in Intercultural Studies.

CM 367 CROSS-CULTURAL PRACTICUM

3 credits

This practicum take place in two components: 1) a classroom experience at the Prairie campus to prepare for the international experience and 2) a three week immersion experience in a culturally diverse setting with the intention of enhancing the learner's awareness of the varied clinical settings and complexities of practicing in an international setting. The focal point of the international community practicum is the health of populations in an international setting. The ability to recognize and promote the needs of the community while understanding the needs of the individual is integral to this practicum. This includes the capacity to understand the predisposing factors of illness and disease and apply in a context of health promotion and illness prevention.

Note: Practical Nursing students only

CM 368 DIGITAL MEDIA PRACTICUM

3 credits

The Digital Media Practicum is a capstone course that allows students to integrate what they have learned throughout the program in a culminating experience. Students will participate in experiential learning within a context to utilize digital media. Students will be using the skills they have learned in the Digital Media program to be effective story-tellers in a context in which skills and abilities will contribute to the building of God's Kingdom. The students will be building visual portfolios to add to their existing content on the web, social media fee, and physical portfolio. Through academic and experiential learning students will gain in developing their competencies and talents in real-world scenarios and events.

Note: Diploma in Digital Media students only.

CM 370-73 OUTDOOR LEADERSHIP INTERNSHIP I-IV

12 credits

Effective ministry necessitates both a foundation of biblical and theological knowledge, and development of certain sets of ministry-related skills. The Explore Internship creates an opportunity to expand knowledge of the Bible and theology, simultaneous with the development of necessary ministry skills. The Explore Internship spans two years and fulfills the internship requirements for students enrolled in the Bachelor of Arts in Ministry with the Outdoor Leadership Major. The Director(s) of the Explore Program will coach,

advise, and supervise the Intern while providing formal evaluations of the Intern's performance. The Intern will also complete regular self-evaluations and projects related to the Intern's administrative tasks, program development, and experiential education within the Explore Program.

Note: Outdoor Leadership students only.

CM 386-87 SOCIAL JUSTICE INTERNSHIP

12 credits

This GlobeTREK internship is an 8-month immersion in other cultures, engaging in a number of formal and informal learning activities. For two months, students travel as a team and visit numerous different ministries, agencies and nations. For six months in the middle of the journey, the student is involved in a ministry of their choice in a nation of their choice with a focus on social justice issues. Expatriate mentors (preferably Canadians) and local supervisors will guide the student in their learning and practical experiences.

Note: Available only on the field during the GlobeTREK year in Bachelor of Arts in Intercultural Studies.

CM 464 PASTORAL MINISTRY INTERNSHIP

12 credits

In consultation with the Pastoral Director and partnering churches, students will be placed in intentional ministry settings culminating their field training. Pastoral internships may be crafted to suit desired objectives (e.g. chaplaincy, pastoral leadership or parachurch ministry). Internships generally run 8-12 months in length.

Note: Requires permission of Pastoral Director.

CM 465 SPORTS INTERNSHIP

6 credits

Experientially learn current practice-based methods from knowledgeable sports management practitioners within a field context. Apply theoretical content in a practical sports management-based setting. Develop, measure and evaluate your skill set and knowledge base relative to the industry needs. Gain a greater appreciation for the role and function of sports management professionals. Work in conjunction with Internship Supervisor and Faculty Advisor in the formation and implementation of a major project.

CM 468 YOUTH MINISTRY INTERNSHIP

12 credits

A program that will provide instruction and experience in the realm of ministry under the direct supervision and training of a qualified Christian worker/missionary. Students will apply individually to the Faculty Advisor and contact a church or para-ministry in regards to their Internship placement.

Note: Requires permission of Youth Director

CM 474 SPORTS PRACTICUM – INTERNATIONAL MINISTRY

3 credits

TBD

Note: Offered on demand.

CM 478 CHRISTIAN FORMATION INTERNSHIP

9 credits

The program will provide instruction and experience in the realm of ministry under the direct supervision and training of a qualified Christian. The student will also have regular sessions with an appointed spiritual director. Students will apply individually to the Program Director after contacting the church or agency. The Internship Supervisor will berequired to submit evaluations and may be contacted for a phone conversation halfway through the internship.

Note: Requires consultation with Christian Formation Director

CM 479 PRACTICUM IN SPIRITUAL DIRECTION

3 credits

This course is the second part of Urban Sanctuary's certificate in spiritual direction program. Students will offer 15 hours of supervised spiritual direction to another person (usually in the context of their internship). A spiritual director from Urban Sanctuary will provide supervision and debrief of each session offered by the student.

Prerequisite: CF 430 Theory and Practice of Spiritual Direction

Note: Bachelor of Arts in Ministry/Christian Formation and Counselling or Diploma in Christian Formation students only.

CM 481-82 BUSINESS INTERNSHIP

12 credits

The Business Internship course consists of a minimum four month internship placement in a business context that is suited to the student's interests, abilities, and educational goals. Specific responsibilities, dependent on the student and organization, will be given to the intern in addition to gaining broad exposure to the overall business operation. High levels of mentorship and development are

expected to take place as the intern seeks to serve the organization by applying their effort, abilities, and knowledge to the roles and responsibilities they are given.

Note: Bachelor of Divinity in Business Administration students only.

DM DIGITAL MEDIA

Digital Media courses cannot be audited. Many Digital Media courses require specific equipment. See list under 'Hardware and Software Requirements' here.

DM 103 INTRODUCTION TO DIGITAL MEDIA

1 credit

An introduction of Digital Media for all the students enrolled in the Music & Worship Arts Program, this course will give students an overview of digital photography, social media design, video production, and filmmaking. Anyone who aspires to be a recording artist or worship pastor at a modern church will need to know the basics of how digital media works and how to work with visual artists. This course will help prepare recording artists, songwriters, musicians and worship leaders to co-work and complete projects and live events with visual artists.

Note: This course is taught by the Music & Worship Arts department and is for Bachelor of Arts in Ministry/Worship Leading and Music and Diploma in Music and Worship Arts students only.

DM 120 INTRODUCTION TO AUDIO AND COLOR IN FILM

2 credits

This course intends to provide a basic skill set whereby students can produce the audio component of video projects for not-for-profit and mission-based organizations. Topics covered include pre-production, production, post-production, as well as gear use, software use (Audition), and formats for projects so that the students will have a working knowledge sufficient to produce small scale, promo/interview projects. The course will introduce students to the importance of audio within their films in order to better serve their storytelling. It will equip them with the knowledge needed to perform basic post-production tasks from an audio perspective and give them the vocabulary and skillet to both record and edit sound for video. Students should have at least two projects as part of their portfolio at the end of this course. The course will be adaptive, meaning the instructor will adjust how much time is spent covering the basics. The projects that will be chosen, and their unique needs, will vary, also requiring adaptation.

Note: Bachelor of Divinity in Business Administration/Digital Media and Diploma in Digital Media students only.

DM 130 ADVANCED DRONE OPERATOR

1 credit

To legally operate a drone in Canada, Transport Canada requires all Drone Pilots carry an operating certificate issued by Transport Canada. Students will complete an instructor assisted course, exam, and flight test to acquire their National Advanced Operations Certificate for drones under 25 kg.

Note: During the Digital Media Orientation, students will be given instructions on how to apply and pay an additional fee for this course in the amount of \$239.19 plus gst which is due before the first class.

DM 134 FUNDAMENTALS OF FILMMAKING

3 credits

This course intends to provide a basic skill set whereby students can produce video projects for not-for-profit and mission-based organizations. Topics covered include pre-production, production, post-production, as well as gear use, software use (Premiere), and formats for projects so that the students will have a working knowledge sufficient to produce small scale, promo/interview projects. The course will start introducing to students to the medium of film as a storytelling mechanism, and continue to equip them with the knowledge needed to perform basic post-production tasks. Students should have at least two projects as part of their portfolio at the end of this course. The course will be adaptive, meaning the instructor will adjust how much time is spent covering the basics. The projects that will be chosen, and their unique needs, will vary, also requiring adaptation.

Note: Bachelor of Divinity in Business Administration/Digital Media and Diploma in Digital Media students only.

DM 135 INTRODUCTORY FILM PRODUCTION

1.5 credits

TBD

DM 145 FUNDAMENTALS OF PHOTOGRAPHY

3 credits

This course is a fast paced introduction to the basics of the craft, techniques, and concepts of photography. Motivated students will rapidly change from being picture takers to photography artists.

DM 160 FUNDAMENTALS OF DIGITAL MEDIA BUSINESS I 1 credit
DM 161 FUNDAMENTALS OF DIGITAL MEDIA BUSINESS II 1 credit
DM 260 FUNDAMENTALS OF DIGITAL MEDIA BUSINESS III 1 credit
DM 261 FUNDAMENTALS OF DIGITAL MEDIA BUSINESS IV 1 credit

This four-part course introduces students to the basic elements needed in setting up and operating a successful Digital Media business. Topics will include business planning, budgeting, pricing, client contracts, waivers, and working with partners in larger production teams.

DM 177 PORTFOLIO 1

Portfolio is a practical, hands-on course designed to help first-year digital media students obtain a web presence as well as introduce them to professional ink jet printers and printing.

Notes: 1) Bachelor of Divinity in Business Administration/Digital Media and Diploma in Digital Media students only; 2) Requires instructor's permission; 3) \$175 additional fee.

DM 228 AFTER EFFECTS

3 credits

This course intends to introduce students to Adobe After Effects as it pertains to video editors. We will cover the basics of Masks, introduction to compositing, animating text, and basic motion tracking. Course flow and projects will be adapted to the needs and aptitudes of the students.

DM 234 ADVANCED FILMMAKING

4.5 credits

Provides a basic skill set whereby students can produce video projects for not-for-profit and mission-based organizations. Topics covered include pre-production, production, post-production, gear use, software use (Premiere), and formats for projects so that the students will have a working knowledge sufficient to produce small scale, doc-style projects. Reviews the elements of DM 134 and covers more advanced techniques for moving cameras and post-production. Students should have at least two projects as part of their portfolio at the end of this course.

Prerequisite: DM 134 Fundamentals of Filmmaking

DM 235 ADVANCED FILM PRODUCTION

3 credits

This course provides an advanced skill set whereby students can be a vital part of the production component of a narrative creative film project. Topics covered include cinematography, lighting, advanced post production, grip, foley, and camera operator as part of a team. The course will focus on being the "production company" for a script written, directed, and acted by Rosebud School of The Arts students and staff. It will equip students with the knowledge needed to perform advanced production and post production on a larger more narrative creative project. Students will have at least once scene from creative film that is filmed by them, one scene that is edited by them and multiple scenes where they occupy additional production roles for their portfolio, and resume. The course will be adaptive, meaning the instructor will adjust how much time is spent covering the basics. The roles that will be chosen, and their unique needs, will vary, also requiring adaptation.

DM 236 DOCUMENTARY FILMMAKING

3 credits

This course will equip students with the skills and knowledge crucial in producing professional documentaries. Students will learn the essential elements of crafting a nonfiction story focusing on themes, interview skills, and supporting B-roll footage.

DM 242 WEDDING PHOTOGRAPHY

3 credits

This course will give students the tools to confidently execute large wedding productions including understanding your clients, organization, budgeting, pricing, and successfully carrying out these events in a high-paced environment.

DM 245 ADVANCED PHOTOGRAPHY

3 credits

Advanced Photography picks up where Fundamentals of Photography left off. It provides an advanced use of software applications, how to work in a studio environment with various types of lighting, and prepares students to master the controls of camera functions and strobe lighting.

Prerequisite: DM 145 Fundamentals of Photography

DM 262 PRINCIPLES OF MARKETING

1 credit

An essential part of working in digital media is an understanding of marketing. Not only must good design be based on the principles of visual design, it must be able to sell a product, service, person, or organization to the target audience. This course is an introduction to the concepts and practices of marketing both to and for clients. Instructors will speak from the theoretical frameworks as well as personal experience to give students both a solid understanding of principles as well as examples of practical practice.

DM 277 PORTFOLIO 2—BOOK/WEBSITE

1 credit

Portfolio 2 is a practical, hands-on course designed to help get the talents of 2nd year digital media students exposed to potential clients. **Notes:** 1) Diploma in Digital Media students only; 2) \$175 additional fee.

EL EDUCATION LEADERSHIP

EL 503 FUNDAMENTALS OF GLOBAL CHRISTIAN EDUCATION LEADERSHIP 3 credit

This course addresses several salient leadership issues facing Christian leaders in an organizational and ministry context. Topics include approaches and theories to leadership, emotional and cultural intelligence, and conflict management. Each of these topics influences the effectiveness of a contemporary leader in an organizational and ministry context.

EL 514 EDUCATION AS MISSION

3 credits

Prairie has partnered with Teach Beyond in the development of this course. This course will enable students to examine the theory and practice of transformational education and its role in mission and the holistic development of persons and communities. Students will be introduced to a variety of opportunities in "education is mission" and the resources necessary to work in and/or start formal and informal transformational education projects pertinent for their contexts. This course builds on and complements the competencies and learning objectives from preceding courses.

EL 541 RESEARCH METHODOLOGIES

3 credits

This course will provide an opportunity for students to develop an understanding of the research process through an exploration of research concepts and theories. The course introduces the elements of a research framework (introduction, purpose statement, research questions & hypotheses), research writing, ethics in research and research methods (qualitative, quantitative, and mixed methods approaches). With this knowledge, students will be able to conduct scholarly research in their specified areas and determine how research findings are useful in helping them to understand their world.

EL 562 GLOBALIZATION AND CHRISTIAN EDUCATIONAL CHANGE IN THE 21ST CENTURY

3 credits

This course has two basic sections. The first is an introduction to competing understandings and definitions of globalization, along with challenges and opportunites it poses for educational institutions. The second is a more detailed study of the historical development of globalization with particular attention given to the theme of Christian mission. From this students will develop a 'glocalized' theology of Christian education/formation for globalized times In their local context.

EL 564 TRENDS AND ISSUES IN MULTICULTURAL EDUCATION

3 credits

This course provides an examination of today's global and multicultural education and methods of teaching. It will focus on eliminating the barriers to cultural understanding. Participants will examine possible challenges in various multicultural contexts and develop strategies to create a learning environment where all students are considered, validated, and nurtured.

EL 611 CHRISTIAN PHILOSOPHY OF EDUCATION IN THE GLOBAL CONTEXT 3 credits

This course provides an opportunity to create a personal biblical philosophy of education in a global context. One of the key steps in this process is to spend some time reflecting on all that has been learned in previous courses. This course is set up to provide guided steps and guided reflection in crafting a personal biblical philosophy.

EL 620 EDUCATIONAL LEADER AS ORGANIZATIONAL STEWARD

3 credits

In this course, we will focus on a variety of challenges that those in administration face: dealing with conflict, creating policies for a variety of student needs, and developing and implementing stewardship principles.

EL 633 INTEGRATION OF BIBLICAL PRINCIPLES IN EDUCATION

3 credits

This course starts off with a review of a biblical worldview and then a variety of learning theories and instructional planning document formats are introduced. From there we move into applying that worldview to every element of instructional planning: developing an overarching framework, removing barriers, planning for meeting outcomes, and differentiating instruction based on specific student needs.

EL 641 LEADER AS INSTRUCTIONAL COACH

3 credits

In this course, we will focus now on how we coach and empower others to do the same. We will explore what instructional coaching is, our role as leaders as instructional coaches, culturally proficient coaching, and why/how to establish a culture of coaching.

EL 650 DIGITAL LEADERSHIP IN EDUCATION

3 credits

This course will help students begin to develop a Biblical worldview of technology, provide an overview of the responsibilities we have as digital leaders in education, and explore how to use the ISTE standards for students, educators, and educational leaders effectively in our contexts.

EL 670 CAPSTONE PROJECT

3 credits

The Capstone project will be an ongoing project throughout the program with special attention given to its completion at this stage. The program director will work with students over the entire program as they develop, implement, and complete their Capstone Project.

HF HUMANITIES AND FINE ARTS

HF 094 STUDENT SUCCESS LAB

1 credit

This lab focuses on the basic elements of writing intelligent and compelling essays and trains the student to read critically. In addition, it will assist the student in different areas of academic life to improve his/her academic standing. This course is treated as a workshop where the work is done in class and special attention is given to each individual student to prepare them for further college education.

Note: Not for credit on any academic program.

HF 110 WRITTEN COMPOSITION

3 credits

This course provides students with a solid grounding in the processes that writers use to communicate clearly in an academic context with a focus on the mechanics of writing college-level essays and papers. Students will be introduced to strategies for developing an essay, enhancing writing skills, appropriate research procedures including using a library effectively, essay formatting, and documentation.

HF 111 THINKING AND WRITING

3 credits

Thinking and Writing uses a focus on critical examination of the many views opposing the Christian faith to teach the skills of research, argumentation, and writing. The student critically engages with various perspectives he is likely to encounter in the workplace. A variety of writing exercises develops his ability to address opposing positions through appropriate research, analysis of resources, and proper and prayerful argumentation.

Note: Also available through Online Education.

HF 115 FUNDAMENTALS OF STORYTELLING

3 credits

This course offers a number of entry points into a broad and deep subject of how and why we tell stories. In part it is a pragmatic look at the craft required for telling stories. In part it is an opportunity to give attention and intention to the stories each of us carry, and how exchanging them is one of the most generous gifts we have to give.

HF 151 HOW MUSIC WORKS

3 credits

The music that we write and love today comes from somewhere. It's like a branch connected to the trunk and ultimately the roots of the tree. Our enjoyment of the current branch of music will grow as we are able to survey and take in the beauty of the full tree. This class will be an overview of the essence and history of music. Together we will explore why music moves us emotionally and what the connection is between music and spirituality.

HF 221 FIELD LANGUAGE I

3 credits

An on-the-field introduction to a language.

Prerequisite: HF 110 Written Composition or HF 111 Thinking and Writing

Note: available only on the field during the GlobeTREK year in Bachelor of Arts in Intercultural Studies.

HF 231 HISTORY OF WESTERN CIVILIZATION I

3 credits

This course covers, in survey fashion, the events and themes which make up the early part of the story of the western world. The chronological range extends from the period of the earliest known ancient near eastern civilizations through to the end of the medieval period (mid-15th century) in Europe. While related historical events in other parts of the globe will be used as reference points, the primary geographical stage will be the regions of the Middle East, the Mediterranean basin and the wider European subcontinent. The course focuses on key events, people and ideas which played a formative role in developing this collective entity referred to as Western

Prerequisite: HF 110 Written Composition or HF 111 Thinking and Writing

Note: Also available through Online Education.

HF 232 HISTORY OF WESTERN CIVILIZATION II

3 credits

This course picks up the narrative of western civilization where HF 231 left off. It covers the period from the late Middle Ages to the late 20th century. Two key questions which the course seeks to answer are: 1) what is modernity? and 2) how has it formed western civilization and then the world beyond the West? Or, 'How did the West become the West?' While using political events as the primary reference points in mapping the historical narrative, the course will also examine a variety of other cultural events, people and movements which formed the spirit of the age. These include: religious/philosophical ideas, especially as they are expressed in art, architecture, music and literature; developments in the fields of science and commerce; and key social institutions/practices. Students will also practice the craft of history by producing an historical account of their own.

Prerequisite: HF 110 Written Composition or HF 111 Thinking and Writing

Note: Also available through Online Education.

HF 242 SURVEY OF WESTERN PHILOSOPHY

3 credits

A survey of the major historical and thematic contours in western philosophy from a Christian perspective. The first half of the course focuses on the major historical milestones in the history of western philosophy beginning with the pre-Socratics and continuing with philosophers from classical antiquity, the medieval period, the enlightenment, and modernity. In the second half, the focus shifts to the major thematic emphases in contemporary philosophy. Throughout the course, particular attention will be paid to relationships between Christianity and the philosophical themes under consideration.

Prerequisite: HF 110 Written Composition or HF 111 Thinking and Writing

Note: Offered on demand.

HF 290/391/490 DIRECTED STUDY

2 or 3 credits

Guided independent study in which students design and carry out research or a project of their own choosing. Requirements will be set in accordance with the nature of the research or project, which must be approved by a faculty supervisor, the Dean, and the Registrar. Prerequisite: Consent of supervisor, cumulative g.p.a. of at least 2.3, not on Academic Probation.

HF 321 FIELD LANGUAGE II

3 credits

A continuation of HF 221 Field Language I. Prerequisite: HF 221 Field Language I

Note: Available only on the field during the GlobeTREK year in Bachelor of Arts in Intercultural Studies.

HF 334, 534 HISTORY OF CHRISTIANITY IN THE ANCIENT AND MEDIEVAL WORLD 3 credits

As the title indicates, the content of this course deals with the story of Christianity's growth from a small Jewish sect to a global faith movement. Beginning with the New Testament period and proceeding through the 14th century, this course will examine the significant events, personalities and cultural issues which played a role in defining and spreading the Christian faith. Classroom discussions – interspersed with some lecture material - will deal with both the institutional developments of the church as well as the development of Christianity in its everyday social context. A dominant theme of the course is examining how the Christian community of each generation and culture dealt with the tension between accommodating the gospel message to the contours of specific cultures it penetrated, and at the same time speaking prophetically in calling people to a counter-cultural faith. In summary, the course looks at the history of

Christianity as it simultaneously confronts and acclimates itself to the cultures it encounters.

Prerequisite: HF 231 History of Western Civilization I or HF 232 History of Western Civilization II

Note: Offered in alternate years.

HF 335, 535 HISTORY OF CHRISTIANITY IN THE MODERN WORLD

3 credits

This course covers the history of the church, in both its western and global expressions, from the period of the Reformations of the sixteenth century to the beginning of the twenty-first century. Particular attention will be given to the theme of Christianity as a missionary faith which moved across cultures and adapted to different settings, while at the same time transforming the cultures into which it moved. A second theme will be that of stagnation and renewal through church and para-church initiatives. Course content is a combination of theological developments painted in broad brush strokes and more detailed sketches of particular people and their practices who had a notable influence on church life and Christian cultural engagement.

Prerequisite: HF 231 History of Western Civilization I or HF 232 History of Western Civilization II

Note: Offered in alternate years.

HF 336 EXPERIENCING HISTORY AND CULTIVATING HISTORICAL CONSCIOUSNESS

3 credits

This is a two-week study tour during which students will visit a variety of historical sites in Europe and/or the Mediterranean region. Students will have opportunity to interact directly with historical sites and artifacts and gain a greater knowledge of their significance for earlier eras and a deeper understanding of the ways in which they continue to shape the culture of our own times.

Prerequisite: two of HF 231 History of Western Civilization I, HF 232 History of Western Civilization II, HF 334 History Of Christianity In The Ancient And Medieval World, HF 335 History Of Christianity In The Modern World

Note: Offered on demand.

HF 403 HUMANITIES DIRECTED STUDY

3 credits

This course is a combination of seminar and individual tutorial in which students will be required to develop a research topic, identify the key authorities on the topic and their respective interpretive positions and articulate their own critical response.

HF 406 HUMANITIES RESEARCH PAPER

3 credits

This course is a combination of seminar and individual tutorial in which students will produce a research paper based on the topic of study and their findings from HF 403. In addition to interacting with the key authorities on the topic, they will be expected to integrate their position on the topic as a critical response to their research findings. In writing their paper students will need to clearly articulate both thesis and methodology being used in presenting their material. In addition to submitting a written essay students will also have opportunity to present a summary of their paper in a seminar forum.

Prerequisite: HF 403 Humanities Directed Study

HF 430 TOPICS IN HISTORY

3 credits

A study of a selected topic or topics in history.

Note: Offered on demand.

IS INTERCULTURAL STUDIES

IS 140 WORLD RELIGIONS

3 credits

A basic understanding of the beliefs, doctrines, and practices of the major world religions will allow Christians to be more effective in their witness for Christ in today's multicultural world. After a survey of the ideas, philosophy, doctrine, and major practices of the main religions we will discuss how our Gospel witness can be/should be contextualized to people from a particular world religion. We will not include Christianity or Judaism in our study. Includes visits to places of worship in Calgary.

Notes: 1) Also available through Online Education; 2) Listed in ACAT Guide; 3) Requires additional fee of \$85.

IS 151 PREPARATION FOR INTERCULTURAL MINISTRY

1 credit

This one-credit course will prepare you to understand and appreciate what God is doing around the world today. We begin with an overview of "mission" in the Bible, followed by an express train ride of western missions through history. We will look at current day "missions" methods, needs, the future of missions, and how to engage in sharing Christ in Canada through our words and actions.

IS 259, 261 INTERNSHIP PREPARATION SEMINAR—PARTS 1, 2

3 credits

This course will help equip students for successfully entering and living within a culture other than their own. It will be organized around the themes of "Know, Be, and Do:" what needs to be known or understood, what kind of person succeeds, and what skills are necessary to live and minister well in another culture. There will be some lectures along with significant experienctial learning activities focused on team building. This course will include all the practical preparation for students going on GlobeTREK, i.e. writing prayer letters, fundraising, and requesting visa to different nations.

Notes: 1) Bachelor of Arts in Intercultural Studies students only; 2) Requires permission of instructor.

IS 263 PRACTICUM PREPARATION SEMINAR

3 credits

The course is designed to prepare students for their first major international trip and also to learn how to prepare for future international travel. Emphasis is given both to the practical steps necessary for successful travel as well as preparation for the personal, interpersonal, and cultural dynamics that occur when living in a new culture. Good preparation greatly affects your ability to make the adjustments and learn to minister effectively in a culture other than your own.

Note: Bachelor of Divinity in Business Administration/Intercultural Studies students only.

IS 290/391/490 DIRECTED STUDY

2 or 3 credits

Guided independent study in which students design and carry out research or a project of their own choosing. Requirements will be set in accordance with the nature of the research or project, which must be approved by a faculty supervisor, the Dean, and the Registrar. *Prerequisite: Consent of supervisor, cumulative GPA of at least 2.3, not on Academic Probation.*

IS 351 CROSS-CULTURAL COMMUNICATION

3 credits

In this course, we will deal with foundational principles for communication between people from different cultures. You will learn to be aware of the influence of thinking processes, worldviews, plus verbaland non-verbal behaviours. We will also cover aspects of anxiety and uncertainty that everyone faces when communicating with someone from a different culture. Most of the assignments will relate to you applying the teaching to your own interaction with different cultures or people from different cultures.

Prerequisites: IS 140 World Religions, SS 170 Christianity in the 21st Century World, and SS 273: Cultural Anthropology **Note:** Also available by Online Education.

IS 473 TOPICS IN GLOBAL STUDIES

3 credits

Current hot topics in the area of missions are discussed as preparation for the student entering and working in cross-cultural settings. This is the capstone course for the IS students and their interests will be taken into consideration when choosing the topics. *Prerequisite: GlobeTREK year*

MU MUSIC

MU 155, 156, 158, 159, 255, 256, 258, 259, 355, 356, 358, 359, 455, 456, 458, 459 MUSIC LESSONS—

Voice, Piano, Strings, Percussion

1-3 credits

Private lessons are taught weekly on a one-to-one basis. Subject material is chosen by the instructor from a range of styles and genres to meet the needs of each student while fulfilling the guidelines set out by each respective area. Students are expected to participate regularly in performance classes. End-of-semester adjudications and/or recitals serve as final exams.

Notes: 1) No auditing; 2) Requires Additional fee: \$325 for 30 minute lessons, \$487.50 for 45 minute lessons, or \$650 for 60 minute lessons; 3) Lessons must be scheduled at same time on same days throughout the semester.

MU 167-68 SIGHT READING AND EAR TRAINING—PARTS 1, 2

3 credits

Ear training and Sight-singing is a core requirement for all musicians; it assists them in mastering the technical and stylistic aspects of an instrument, in notating original music and arrangements, and in understanding what they are hearing. In this course, students will develop basic ear training & sight reading skills through performance and dictation. They will study melodies, intervals, harmony, and solfege in major keys, as well as basic rhythms in the most common meters.

MU 191, 196, 291, 296, 391, 396, 491, 496 PERFORMING ENSEMBLE

1.5 credits per semester

The Performance Ensemble class is designed to give Music and Worship Arts students practical experiences in singing and in playing their instrument as part of a larger music ensemble. Students will be members of the Community Choir, which has a weekly rehearsal and an end-of-semester concert, to aid in the practice and training of the voice through singing. In addition, students will be placed into groups and through a given assignment will practice the art and craft of creating and playing music together.

Notes: 1) Bachelor of Arts in Ministry/Worship Leading and Music and Diploma in Music and Worship Arts students only for the performance groups portion of the course; 2) By audition.

MU 193 COMMUNITY CHOIR

1 credit per semester

The Community Choir is designed to provide Music and Worship Arts students with an opportunity to gain further experience and opportunity to sing in a large ensemble. Voice part singing along with a variety in repertoire will provide the music student with ample opportunities to improve their vocal singing as well as part and blending components.

Note: No auditing.

MU 194 APPLIED BAND/ENSEMBLE

1 credit

This performance ensemble class is designed to give Music and Worship Arts students practical experiences in singing and in playing their instrument as part of a larger music ensemble. Students will be placed into groups and through a given assignment will practice the art and craft of creating and playing music together.

Note: No auditing.

NT NEW TESTAMENT

NT 112 READING THE GOSPELS AND ACTS

3 credits

In this course, students are introduced to the story of Jesus Christ and his earliest disciples as told by the four Gospels and the book of Acts. Students will grow in their understanding of who Jesus is as well as in their ability to interpret the Bible by attending to its literary, historical, and theological character.

Note: Also available through Online Education

NT 206 INTRODUCTION TO BIBLICAL GREEK

3 credits

An introduction to biblical Greek grammar, focusing on nouns and introducing verbs, along with a basic reading vocabulary. **Notes:** 1) Also available through Online Education as NT 206 Introduction to Biblical Greek I, 2) Offered on demand.

NT 221 READING PAUL'S LETTERS

3 credits

This course is an introduction to the life and letters of the apostle Paul. Students will gain a basic understanding of the historical, literary, and theological characteristics of each of Paul's letters, and in the process will further develop their skills in attentive and critical Bible reading.

Prerequisite: NT 112 Reading the Gospels and Acts. **Note:** Also available through Online Education.

NT 290/391/490 DIRECTED STUDY

2 or 3 credits

Guided independent study in which students design and carry out research or a project of their own choosing. Requirements will be set in accordance with the nature of the research or project, which must be approved by a faculty supervisor, the Dean, and the Registrar. *Prerequisite: Consent of supervisor, cumulative g.p.a. of at least 2.3, not on Academic Probation.*

NT 307 INTRODUCTION TO BIBLICAL GREEK II

3 credits

This course continues the study of the grammar of the Greek New Testament with special emphasis on learning the vocabulary and basic grammatical forms necessary to read and study the New Testament in its original language.

Prerequisite: NT 206 Introduction to Biblical Greek I

Note: Available through Online Education only.

NT 318 ENCOUNTERING JESUS IN JOHN'S GOSPEL

This course offers a literary, historical, and theological engagement with the Gospel of John—one of the most influential writings in the whole of Scripture. For John, the disclosure of God in and through his unique Son, portrayed in the Gospel, is the climactic event of history. Through a combination of audio, video, and reading, this course will feature a survey of John's Gospel, noting significant distinctive themes along the way, such as Jesus' "signs," divine "glory," and the relationship of John's Gospel to the Old Testament. It will also highlight the main issues involved in reading and interpreting John's Gospel, and some scholarly debates which affect our understanding.

Prerequisite: NT 112 Reading the Gospels and Acts **Note:** Available through Online Education only.

NT 351 READING HEBREWS TO REVELATION

3 credits

In this course, students are introduced to the book of Hebrews, the Catholic epistles (James, 1, 2 Peter, 1, 2, 3, John, Jude), and the book of Revelation. This course will focus on the ways in which the earliest Christians navigated the eschatological tension between the first and second comings of Jesus. In the process, students will gain further understanding of the historical circumstances of Christians living in the late first-century Roman empire, as well as extend interpretive skills development (esp. literary analysis, canonical integration, history of interpretation, and theological appropriation).

Prerequisite: NT 221 Reading Paul's Letters **Note:** Also available through Online Education.

NT 3xx and NT 4xx NEW TESTAMENT ELECTIVES

3 credits

Various electives will be offered, focusing on books, methods, or genres.

Prerequisite: for NT 3xx, one 200-level NT course; for NT 4xx, one 300-level NT course

NT 467 REVELATION 3 credits

This course is devoted to the interpretation of Revelation. Students will sharpen their biblical interpretation skills by attending to Revelation's historical, literary, and theological character. Students will also critically attend to the ways in which Christians have interpreted Revelation in the past as they interpret what it means for the church today.

Prerequisite: NT 351 Reading Hebrews to Revelation

Note: Offered on demand.

NT 492 GRECO-ROMAN CONTEXTS OF THE NEW TESTAMENT

3 credits

This course offers an advanced introduction to interpreting New Testament texts in light of their ancient Greco-Roman environments. The course covers topics such as poverty, ancient city life, slavery, friends and family, honour and shame, patrons and clients. Students study each topic in connection with relevant passages from the New Testament in order to better understand their historical contexts as well as to practice theological appropriation of these passages for the Church today.

Prerequisite: NT 351 Reading Hebrews to Revelation

Note: Offered on demand.

OL OUTDOOR LEADERSHIP

Note: Many of the OL courses are offered only to OL students at Frontier Lodge, Nordegg, Alberta. OL courses that qualify as electives on the Bachelor of Arts in Ministry/OL are offered on demand.

OL 104 INTRODUCTION TO EXPERIENTIAL EDUCATION

1.5 credits

This class is an introduction to the skills, knowledge, and principles necessary to understand and use the experiential education method effectively. Students will experience the model throughout their time in the Explore Program, but concentrated time is set aside to learn about how the student can facilitate experiences towards the learner's growth and development. A three-day seminar, paired with a practicum opportunity will form the main means of curriculum delivery and application. The experience and practice of the concepts from this class, however, are found throughout the entirety of the program.

Note: Students on Christian Formation and Outdoor Leadership programs only.

OL 116 WILDERNESS ADVANCED FIRST AID

1.5 credits

Wilderness Advanced First Aid training is the entry level certification for outdoor professionals, guides, and instructors who work in a wilderness setting. Course content extends beyond urban-based first aid programs to include elements inherent in leading groups in the outdoors and guiding wilderness adventures. Special emphasis is placed on prevention of injuries, accident scene management, leadership, leader responsibility and liability, advanced first aid kits, wound management and managing the trauma victim.

Note: Students on Outdoor Leadership programs only.

OL 134 OUTDOOR LEADERSHIP

1.5 credits

This class serves to provide students, both in theory and practice, with a framework for understanding leadership. In particular, this class hopes to provide students the knowledge necessary to successfully lead or follow well in the Outdoor context. This class will present the transactional and transformational model of leadership to students as a framework for understanding how leadership works from the perspective of leader, follower or from an undefined role. The class addresses but moves past leader/follower functions to examine how "leadership" can come from anywhere, given a proper understanding and application of power, authority, and influence.

Note: Students on Outdoor Leadership programs only.

OL 136 OUTDOOR LEADERSHIP FOR CHRISTIAN FORMATION

1.5 credits

This class serves to provide students a framework for understanding leadership both in theory and in practice. This class will present the transactional and transformational model of leadership to students as a framework for understanding how leadership works from the perspective of leader, follower or from an undefined role. The class addresses but moves past leader/follower functions to examine how "leadership" can come from anywhere, given a proper understanding and application of power, authority, and influence.

Notes: 1) Bachelor of Arts in Ministry/Christian Formation and Counselling and Diploma in Christian Formation students only; 2) Offered on demand.

OL 151 OUTDOOR PROGRAMMING

1.5 credits

This course is designed to introduce students to the basic principles, skills and knowledge necessary to plan and execute successful programming in a wilderness context. The course utilizes the Outdoor Council of Canada (OCC) curriculum for Field Leader Hiking. In addition to the content provided through the OCC course, students will participate in a 5-day backpacking trip that will give opportunity for the students to apply principles, receive feedback and deepen their skillset. A practicum that takes place near the end of the semester will provide an additional opportunity to utilize the skills taught in this class.

Note: Students on Outdoor Leadership programs only.

OL 215 WILDERNESS COMPETENCIES

3 credits

This course is designed to provide the participants with a range of wilderness experiences in order to prepare them to effectively minister through adventure. Students will prepare to become outdoor instructors by learning and applying a comprehensive outdoor leadership curriculum with a focus on biking and backpacking, among other disciplines. Students will have the opportunity to engage in both receiving instruction and skill development alongside opportunities to practice instruction to various groups of students. Instructional experiences will focus on equipping participants with basic competencies in the various skills taught and will also focus on translating adventure environments into ministry opportunities.

Note: Students on Bachelor of Arts in Ministry/Outdoor Leadership and Diploma in Outdoor Leadership only.

OL 224 EXPEDITION AND OUTDOOR LEADERSHIP

6 credits

This course is designed to prepare second-year students with the necessary skills to responsibly lead in outdoor and expedition situations, and to prepare students to enroll in an ACMG Assistant Hiking Guide course. This course will involve a combination of both practical and theoretical knowledge, and will contain a high level of experiential education. By planning and executing an extended backpacking trip, participants will develop sound and defensible judgment practices and skills that are in accordance with professional wilderness industry standards. We also incorporate Explore program philosophy emphasizing spiritual leadership and ministry preparation. At the end of the course students will be prepared to fully plan and execute multi-day backpacking trips.

Note: Students on Bachelor of Arts in Ministry/Outdoor Leadership and Diploma in Outdoor Leadership only.

OL 231 RECREATION AND BUSINESS MANAGEMENT

3 credits

The focus of this course is on the philosophy of adventure business and management as it applies to developing and sustaining programs. Students are challenged to discover their personal ministry philosophy and values, and express them through the creation of a future business/ministry dream. This includes understanding how philosophy and values are key driving forces in all areas of business/ministry such as program development, use of staff and discerning ministry needs.

Notes: 1) Students on Bachelor of Arts in Ministry/Outdoor leadership and Diploma in Outdoor Leadership only; 2) Offered on alternate years.

OL 236 INTERN COMPETENCIES

3 credits

This class exists to give direction and focus to the elements needed to prepare interns for service in the Explore program. Interns will work on Frontier Lodge summer staff and participate in spring and summer camp ministry. There are certain elements of their summer that need to be accomplished in order to be most prepared for success in the program. Interns will receive the training and opportunity over the summer to complete all the objectives in this syllabus satisfactorily. This class works on the pass/fail system. All objectives will need to be completed before credit is awarded for this class.

Note: Students on Bachelor of Arts in Ministry/Outdoor Leadership only.

OL 248 TEACHING THROUGH ADVENTURE

3 credits

A practical, high-paced systems theory examination of teaching in adventure and various other settings. This course will use in-class practice, lecture, homework, practicums, feedback and reflection in order to develop student skills in leadership, communication, planning and educational methods, as well as introduce students to the skills assessment methods necessary to correctly evaluate adventure participant learning and manage participant risk and adventure. This course will be taught integrating elements of the Bible and a Christian worldview.

Note: Students on Bachelor of Arts in Ministry/Outdoor Leadership and Diploma in Outdoor Leadership only.

OL 290/391/490 DIRECTED STUDY

2 or 3 credits

Guided independent study in which students design and carry out research or a project of their own choosing. Requirements will be set in accordance with the nature of the research or project, which must be approved by a faculty supervisor, the Dean, and the Registrar. *Prerequisite: Consent of supervisor, cumulative g.p.a. of at least 2.3, not on Academic Probation.*

OL 312 PLANNING AND LEADING A TEAM TRIP

3 credits

The intern will be responsible to work within a team to plan a team-work oriented experience. The intern will be required to work within a team to develop a purpose and vision for the experience, and plan the event according to the desired outcomes for the trip participants. This process will take the interns through all phases of trip planning; the intern will need to develop the "big picture" for the trip and then actualize the trip through proper planning, attention to detail, collaboration and communication.

Note: Students on Bachelor of Arts in Ministry/Outdoor Leadership only.

OL 315 ADVENTURE TOURISM IN A CROSS-CULTURAL CONTEXT

3 credits

This class serves as an elective opportunity for OL students to learn about the Adventure Tourism industry in a cross-cultural context. Students will travel to Western China where we will partner with Jim Hamp and his adventure tourism business. The first part of the trip will be focused on experiencing and understanding the Western, rural Chinese culture. The second part of the trip will be focused on the adventure tourism industry and how this industry can be used as/on mission for Kingdom building. The third part of the trip will be spent working on outdoor skills in a new environment (the Himalayas) interacting with the rural and/or nomadic Chinese culture and participating and learning how to run an adventure tourism trip.

Notes: 1) Students on Bachelor of Arts in Ministry/Outdoor Leadership and Diploma in Outdoor Leadership only; 2) Offered in alternate years; 3) Offered on demand.

OL 332 PHILOSOPHY OF GROUP FACILITATION

3 credits

This course is a detailed look into the nature of groups and teams. In particular, the course investigates the role of the leader in developing healthy and functional groups that are able to perform effectively (in whatever sense the group exists for) and contribute to the development and well-being of the individuals that compose it. This course will examine the ethics and principles of group facilitation to increase the student's ability, both conceptually and in practice, to effectively lead and participate in teams so that the Kingdom of God is furthered.

Note: Offered in alternate years.

OT OLD TESTAMENT

OT 112 READING THE TORAH

3 credits

A study of the first five books of the Bible, focusing on the historical, literary, and theological features of these books, as well as establishing a strong grounding in Torah principles in preparation for interpreting the rest of Scripture.

Note: Also available through Online Education.

OT 206 INTRODUCTION TO BIBLICAL HEBREW

3 credits

This course introduces biblical Hebrew language using a variety of methods to make the process more intuitive. Students will learn basic Hebrew vocabulary and begin to learn the verbal system. After this term, students will be able to read and understand basic biblical texts and use biblical Hebrew reference tools to help them decode more difficult passages.

Prerequisite: OT 112 Reading the Torah

Notes: 1) Also available through Online Education as OT 206 Introduction to Biblical Hebrew I, 2) Offered on demand.

OT 221 READING THE HISTORICAL BOOKS

3 credits

A study of the books of Joshua, Judges, 1 and 2 Samuel, 1 and 2 Kings and Ezra-Nehemiah in their cultural, historical, and literary setting. Brief interaction with Ruth, Esther, and I and II Chronicles as they relate to the books associated with them. Focuses on interpretive and contextual issues, historical setting, cultural concerns, and their relevance in developing a strong biblical theology in today's world.

Prerequisite: OT 112 Reading the Torah

Note: Also available through Online Education.

OT 290/391/490 DIRECTED STUDY

2 or 3 credits

Guided independent study in which students design and carry out research or a project of their own choosing. Requirements will be set in accordance with the nature of the research or project, which must be approved by a faculty supervisor, the Dean, and the Registrar. *Prerequisite: Consent of supervisor, cumulative g.p.a. of at least 2.3, not on Academic Probation.*

OT 307 INTRODUCTION TO BIBLICAL HEBREW II

3 credits

This course builds on the material and learning of Hebrew I (OT 206) and completes the introduction to the basic grammar and vocabulary of Biblical Hebrew. Preparing students to read portions of the Hebrew Bible on their own, the course offers instruction in lexical and syntactical skills with a primary focus on the Hebrew verbal system. Like Hebrew I, this course is structured around the material provided by Zondervan Academic Online Courses and a Hebrew workbook. The course instructor will monitor the learning process and students may ask questions if needed.

Prerequisite: OT 206 Introduction to Biblical Hebrew I by Online Education.

Note: Available through Online Education only.

OT 343 READING THE PSALMS AND WISDOM LITERATURE

3 credits

A study of Psalms, Job, Proverbs, Ecclesiastes, and Song of Songs, focusing on historical, literary, and theological features with special emphases on Hebrew poetry and ancient Near Eastern Wisdom literature.

Prerequisites: OT 112 Reading the Torah; OT 221 Reading the Historical Books

Note: Also available through Online Education.

OT 3xx and 4xx OLD TESTAMENT ELECTIVES

3 credits

Various electives will be offered, focusing on books, methods, or genres.

Prerequisite: for OT 3xx, one 200-level OT course; for OT 4xx, one 300-level OT course

OT 453 READING THE PROPHETS

3 credits

A study of the Latter Prophets (Isaiah, Jeremiah, Ezekiel, and the Twelve), with Daniel and Lamentations, focusing on developing sensitivity to the historical, literary, and theological dimensions of these books. Class time will include discussion of the relevance of the prophetic books for contemporary critical issues.

Prerequisite: OT 221 Reading the Historical Books and OT 343 Reading the Psalms and Wisdom Literature

Note: Also available through Online Education.

PA PASTORAL MINISTRY

PA 103 LEADERSHIP COACHING

3 credits

An orientation to gospel coaching in its relation to ministry; in-class and out of class practicum involves small group coaching networks and observation. Students will discover that coaching comes from whom God has shaped us and come to appreciate gospel language in the ministry life of Jesus.

Notes: 1) \$100 additional fee for Life Map and travel; 2) Also available through Online Education.

PA 161 INTRODUCTION TO PASTORAL MINISTRY

3 credits

An introduction to contemporary youth and pastoral ministry. Students will examine youth and church culture, various models of youth and pastoral ministry, the biblical and theological foundations for reaching and discipling today's youth and families as well as a short study on the history of youth ministry. The areas of programming, teaching, recruiting, volunteers, and administration, developing relationships with students and families, and personal care in ministry will also be covered.

Notes: 1) Also available through Online Education; 2) students who have credit in YO 151 Introduction to Youth Ministry cannot take this class for credit.

PA 211 PASSIONATE PREACHING AND TEACHING

3 credits

This course is an introduction to preaching and youth communication that covers the creation, development and execution of sermons. In this course, students will have the opportunity to deliver sermons in various settings, even on radio. It is the belief that you learn public speaking through experiential learning.

Note: 1) Also available through Online Education; 2) Students who have credit in YO 314 Youth Communications cannot take this class for credit.

PA 290/391/490 DIRECTED STUDY

2 or 3 credits

Guided independent study in which students design and carry out research or a project of their own choosing. Requirements will be set in accordance with the nature of the research or project, which must be approved by a faculty supervisor, the Dean and the Registrar. *Prerequisite: Consent of supervisor, cumulative g.p.a. of at least 2.3, not on Academic Probation.*

PA 314 AVANCED PREACHING

3 credits

This course is an introduction to preaching and youth communication that covers the creation, development and execution of sermons. In this course, students will have the opportunity to deliver sermons in various settings, even on radio. It is the belief that you learn public speaking through experiential learning.

Note: Available only through Online Education.

PA 372 MISSIONAL LEADERSHIP

3 credits

This course focuses on a Biblical understanding and appreciation of God, as a missional God and the church as God's missional agent in the world. Explores the genesis and development of new initiatives as a substantial ministry in the life of a Christ follower. Students will have hands-on training and study in the observation, development, and rebirth of new missional initiatives. As well, students will formulate a personal missional philosophy for ministry. The pastoral core competencies of evangelism and leadership stem from this course.

Notes: 1) Offered in alternate years; 2) \$500 additional fee for travel; 3) Also available through Online Education.

PA 480 TOPICS IN PASTORAL MINISTRY

3 credits

This course is designed as a capstone course to cover various topics found in the church and parachurch ministry. This course will look at current trends and issues as they relate to youth/pastoral ministry. Students will also assist in the research and presentation of course topics related to present and future ministry. IPSAT training will also be included as a core component in this course.

Prerequisite: PA 161 Introduction to Pastoral Ministry

Note: Students who have credit in YO 460 Topics in Youth Ministry cannot take this class for credit.

PE PHYSICAL EDUCATION

PE 152 PILOTS PARTICIPATION (INDOOR TRACK)

PE 158 PILOTS PARTICIPATION (WOMEN'S FUTSAL)

PE 165 PILOTS PARTICIPATION (CROSS-COUNTRY)

PE 168 PILOTS PARTICIPATION (MEN'S FUTSAL)

Members of the Men's and Women's Pilots athletic teams are eligible for credit upon completion of all of the requirements involved in participation on a Pilots team.

SC SCIENCE

SC 140 HEALTH AND WELLNESS

3 credits

1.5 credits per semester

This class is comprised of a number of experiences designed to introduce students to different activities that promote holistic health and wellness. These activities, in the Explore program, primarily consist of wilderness disciplines such as canoeing, rock climbing, backpacking and mountain biking. These activities will be used to help develop the learner in not only physical health but also emotional, relational and spiritual health through guided facilitation of the experience. Instruction and experience in traditional workout methods, such as running and weight lifting, will also be provided. A large portion of this class will be helping the learner develop the skills necessary to safely enjoy and learn from the experiences in the wilderness disciplines they will encounter.

Note: Explore students only.

SC 141 HEALTH AND WELLNESS

3 credits

This course provides an accurate measure of your fitness at the beginning of the course. Throughout the course you will be introduced to and participate in various physical activities designed to improve your personal fitness level. The final grade will be based upon completion of a personal workout program, improved fitness based on pre and post fitness testing, and completion of course readings. **Note:** Only available by Online Education.

SC 143 OUTDOOR WINTER PURSUITS

3 credits

This class is a highly experiential class that introduces students to different forms of backcountry travel and recreation. Students will also be introduced to both the concepts and the practice of winter survival. Preparation, judgment, teamwork, leadership and decision-making are all central themes to the outdoor pursuits of ice climbing, backcountry skiing, winter camping and survival and will be common subjects that will be learned throughout the course activities.

Notes: 1) Outdoor Leadership students only; 2) Location is Frontier Lodge.

SC 160 METEOROLOGY

3 credits

This course is an introduction to the study of the atmosphere and its changes. It gives an overview of the practical principles that affects air masses and weather systems. Identification of meteorological phenomena and their applications will be discussed.

Prerequisite: Consent of Prairie Aviation Training Centre; a 2.7 cum g.p.a. in previous non-AV courses

Note: No auditing.

SC 230 HISTORY AND PHILOSOPHY OF SCIENCE

3 credits

This course surveys the historical development of scientific thought, primarily in the western tradition, from its origins in ancient Greece to the twentieth century. While the course does examine major figures and their scientific achievements, it does not do so in the context of "science as the inevitable march from primitivism to progress," i.e. science as the continuous accumulation of knowledge and mastery of the natural world. Rather these events will be studied in the context of the prevailing worldview or philosophical paradigm which provided the framework for scientific inquiry and discovery in various cultural periods. As such particular attention will be given to the interplay between philosophical-religious and scientific ideas.

Prerequisite: HF 110 Written Composition or HF 111 Thinking and Writing

Note: Also available by Online Education.

SC 290/391/490 DIRECTED STUDY

2 or 3 credits

Guided independent study in which students design and carry out research or a project of their own choosing. Requirements will be set in accordance with the nature of the research or project, which must be approved by a faculty supervisor, the Dean and the Registrar. *Prerequisite: Consent of supervisor, cumulative g.p.a. of at least 2.3, not on Academic Probation.*

SJ SOCIAL JUSTICE

SJ 101 SOCIAL JUSTICE FOUNDATIONS

3 credits

This course is an introduction to global social justice issues within biblical perspectives and global understandings. The course also covers the development of human rights including political, historical, and philosophical viewpoints.

SJ 367 PROJECT MANAGEMENT

3 credits

This course will introduce the basic elements of project management with a focus on Project Cycle Management (PCM). This method as employed by many non-profit organizations and international development agencies works through the stages of project identification, design, appraisal, proposal preparation, and monitoring and evaluation.

Prerequisite: SS 314 Social Psychology

Note: Bachelor of Arts in Intercultural Studies/Global Social Justice students only.

SJ 393 FIELD CONTEXTUALIZATION

3 credits

Field Contextualization is designed to equip students to recognize, examine, and implement the various contextualization models used in modern missions. Students will understand their philosophical foundations, strengths and weaknesses, and demonstrate how a model of their choosing might be applied in a particular context.

Prerequisite: SJ 101 Social Justice Foundations **Note:** Available only by Online Education.

SP SPORTS MANAGEMENT

SP 141 INTRODUCTION TO SPORTS MANAGEMENT AND LEADERSHIP

3 credits

An introduction to sports management. Primary focus is on sports industry, including professional sports entertainment, amateur, for-profit and nonprofit sports participation, sporting goods, and sports services. Students will examine applications of managerial concepts and processes, and look at the ways in which sports organizations interact with each other, and with corporations, the government and non-governmental organizations. Micro aspects of management applied to sports, including human resources, sports marketing, sponsorship, finance, event management, and sports law.

SP 172 THEOLOGICAL FOUNDATIONS OF SPORT AND LEISURE

3 credits

Sports and leisure not only play a significant role in many people's lives but have developed into large industries that exert a large influence within culture. Christians wishing to engage in sports and leisure actives at any level should do so thoughtfully, aware of both the positive and negative potential results. The role of sports and leisure in Christian life has begun to receive more serious and nuanced attention by academics and pastoral leaders within the Christian church. The goal of this course is for students to enter into this conversation and be introduced to the study of sports and leisure through a theological lens. Students will learn how sports and leisure has historically been viewed within the Christian church and will, throughout the course, be challenged to question their own views on sports, competition, and the ethics of play from a theological viewpoint.

SP 230 SPORTS COACHING AND PERFORMANCE

3 credits

Developing a greater understanding of human behaviour within the sports and exercise setting is an important asset for professionals working in related fields such as fitness instructing, athletic training, sports administration, coaching and recreation planning. This course covers theories of motivation, the impact of stress on performance, the psychological benefits of exercise, strategies for promoting exercise adherence, and the role of mental skills for performance and well-being.

SP 243 EVENT MANAGEMENT AND ADVANCEMENT IN SPORTS

3 credits

The intent of this course is to provide the learner with an overview of the sports tourism industry and to provide them with some of the basic tools needed to successfully plan a sporting event. Learners will be introduced to the sports event and sports tourism industries and be given the opportunity to explore such topics as risk management for sporting events, volunteer management and event sponsorship. Students learn the basic skills needed to conduct a fundraising campaign on behalf of a non-profit organization.

SP 271 FOUNDATIONS OF SPORTS MINISTRY

3 credits

This course provides students with essential practical tools to articulate their reflections on sports and Christianity with the complex and diverse sports ministry realities. The primary focus is on sports ministry in its evangelistic and disciple-making features. Though most of the examples are presented in contexts where the sports ministry happens within Christian contexts, the students will be challenged to reflect on the possibilities of creating a sports ministry in non-Christian-oriented organizations. The students will also have the chance to develop a sports ministry project that will practically demand their learning through the course. Contemporary issues, sports chaplaincy, and athletic ministry models will be part of the class discussions.

SS SOCIAL SCIENCE

SS 150 INTERPERSONAL COMMUNICATION

3 credits

Introduces students to practical concepts of communication and challenges them to apply these concepts in the contexts of interpersonal and group communication. Specific focus will be placed on handling difficult conversations and conflict management skills.

SS 170 CHRISTIANITY IN THE 21ST CENTURY WORLD

3 credits

This course describes and analyzes the range and nature of Christian expression around the world. This will be done in three ways: 1) by briefly describing the four main streams of Christianity evident today; 2) by examining the variety of expressions of indigenous Christianity in the various geographical regions of the globe, and major challenges Christians face in each region; and 3) by getting a brief introduction or how Christianity spread from its Hebrew roots in Palestine to becoming a global faith which is known today as World Christianity (Christianity whose agenda is no longer determined by churches in the nations of the West). The underlying question for Christians living in the West is, 'What is our place and role in this recently altered global landscape of Christianity?' This course will offer some possible answers to that question.

Notes: 1) Additional fee of \$25 for guest speakers; 2) Also available through Online Education.

SS 210 INTRODUCTION TO PSYCHOLOGY

3 credits

An introduction to the major psychological perspectives on human behaviour and cognitive processes including sensation, perception, learning, memory, cognition, human development, motivation, emotion, personality, health, disorders and therapy. Psychological principles are discussed in light of a Christian worldview and their contribution to a broader understanding of human behaviour.

Prerequisite: HF 110 Written Composition or HF 111 Thinking and Writing

Note: Also available through Online Education.

SS 220 INTRODUCTION TO SOCIOLOGY

3 credits

This course explores the foundational scientific, interpretive, and critical orientations of society and social life including culture and diversity. Background will be given to understand the ideas of key and representative thinkers in the field such as Durkheim, Marx, Weber and Lenski. Social inequality, social institutions and global social change are examined through models for understanding the structure and dynamics of social organization.

Note: Only available through Online Education.

SS 222 SOCIOLOGY OF AGING

3 credits

This course examines aging from a sociological viewpoint, emphasizing the social aspects of aging. Theoretical perspectives and research approaches will be considered in relation to a variety of subject areas, including: health, living arrangements, family relationships, informal and formal support, and work and retirement. Students will explore family ties and aging in greater depth and will consider the link between family life and other facets of social life in later life.

Prerequisite: HF 110 Written Composition or HF 111 Thinking and Writing

SS 224 SEXUALITY, SINGLENESS, AND MARRIAGE

3 credits

This course involves a study of topics and issues related to gender, sexuality, friendship, singleness, marriage and family. It will develop a biblical model for character growth as well as principles for marriage and family life essential for sustaining the unexpected challenges and joys involved in shared living.

SS 261 LEADERSHIP FOUNDATIONS

3 credits

This introductory course will assist in nurturing leadership character, convictions and competencies. The foundational content will explore a theology and philosophy of leadership, investigate the formation of a Christian leader and survey the primary tasks of leadership. Building on this foundation, you will receive contextualized training for the specific leadership ministry in which you will be serving during the academic year. You will be challenged toward becoming a godly influencer of others.

Prerequisite: HF 110 Written Composition or HF 111 Thinking and Writing

Note: Also available through Online Education.

SS 273 CULTURAL ANTHROPOLOGY

3 credits

The course is an introductory overview of Cultural Anthropology—the study of human beings from a holistic perspective. We will study theory, insights, and methods used to understand people and their relationships in human cultures. We will learn to understand some basic rationale for different ways of life and how to apply general anthropological knowledge and skills to everyday life in Canada or overseas. The topics include the concept of culture, world view, social organization (kinship, economic, social groups, political, and religious/ideological organization), communication, life cycle, expressive culture, and change.

Prerequisite: HF 110 Written Composition or HF 111 Thinking and Writing

Note: Also available through Online Education.

SS 290/391/490 DIRECTED STUDY

2 or 3 credits

Guided independent study in which students design and carry out research or a project of their own choosing. Requirements will be set in accordance with the nature of the research or project, which must be approved by a faculty supervisor, the Dean, and the Registrar. *Prerequisite: Consent of supervisor, cumulative g.p.a. of at least 2.3, not on Academic Probation*.

SS 311 LIFESPAN DEVELOPMENT

3 credits

Beginning with the concepts of human growth and development, this course will present the major theories of human physical, cognitive, psychosocial, moral and faith development. As an integral part of the study of the theoretical concepts regarding human development, the biblical and cultural nature of theories will be evaluated. The implications and applications of the concepts of human development for workplace and ministry applications comprise a significant portion of this course.

Prerequisite: SS 210 Introduction to Psychology

SS 314 SOCIAL PSYCHOLOGY

3 credits

Social psychologists are interested in the impact that social environment and group interactions have on attitudes and behaviours. This course explores the way in which feelings, thoughts, beliefs, and intentions are constructed and how these factors influence our decisions and interactions with others.

Prerequisite: SS 210 Introduction to Psychology

SS 336 FIELD ETHNOGRAPHY

3 credits

During the six months in one place, you will do participant observation, spontaneous short interviews, long interviews, life stories, and use any other ethnographic research method you choose. You will work on this throughout your time—always asking the question, "What is going on here?" The end result is an interesting narrative about living in the culture and learning to become an insider.

Prerequisite: SS 273 Cultural Anthropology

Note: Available only on the field during the GlobeTREK year in Bachelor of Arts in Intercultural Studies.

ST SPIRITUAL THEOLOGY

ST 100 THE CHRISTIAN LIFE

3 credits

You will be challenged toward intentional pursuit of a love relationship with God as a faithful discipleship response to His person and work. The course content will explore a Christian spiritual theology and practice, not as a formula or recipe, but rather as a transformational relationship with the triune God in which you have both responsibilities and privileges. The course is designed to stretch beyond a cognitive/intellectual exercise so that you will be encouraged to actively engage in the whole-hearted pursuit of relationship with God, both inside and outside of the classroom. The anticipated result is that you will know God more deeply, relate to Him as one intimately known by Him, and desire to make Him known to others.

Note: Also available through Online Education.

ST 103 DISCERNMENT AND DISCIPLESHIP

3 credits

What is God's will for me, both in the day-to-day and over the course of my life? How can I grow in attentive discernment of God's leading? Students will grapple with these questions for themselves and learn to assist others in becoming attentive followers of Jesus.

TH THEOLOGY

TH 100 INTRODUCTION TO CHRISTIAN THEOLOGY

3 credits

This course introduces students to the biblical, doctrinal, philosophical and historical "big picture" outlines of the Christian faith. The course aims to equip students with the skills to develop a Christian mind by assisting them in constructing a theological foundation for thinking and dealing with life's most important issues. This course will also enable students to begin to think theologically and to construct a Christian worldview for the edification of the community of faith and to the glory of the almighty God whom we serve. **Note:** Also available through Online Education.

TH 210 THE GOD OF THE GOSPEL

3 credits

A systematic orientation to the centre of Christian theology—the life of the Triune God. This course will cover the doctrines of God, Trinity, Christ, the Holy Spirit, and Revelation. It will also consider questions of method, including the sources and norms of theology. The discipline of theology will be approached as a practice of the church, both local and global, carried out for the benefit of the church's life, its proclamation, and its service to the world.

Prerequisite: TH 100 Introduction to Christian Theology

Note: Also available through Online Education.

TH 290/391/490 DIRECTED STUDY

2 or 3 credits

A guided independent study in which students design and carry out research or a project of their own choosing. Requirements will be set in accordance with the nature of the research or project, which must be approved by a faculty supervisor, the Dean, and the Registrar. *Prerequisite: Consent of supervisor, cumulative g.p.a. of at least 2.3, not on Academic Probation.*

TH 313 CREATION TO NEW CREATION

3 credits

The purpose of this course, following TH 210, is to provide a systematic orientation to the second half of the field of Christian theology—God's creation. This course will cover the doctrines of creation, humanity, sin, salvation, church and last things. The discipline of theology will be approached as a practice of the church, both local and global, carried out for the benefit of the church's life, its proclamation and its service to the world.

Prerequisite: TH 210 The God of the Gospel **Note:** Also available through Online Education.

TH 332 THEOLOGY OF MISSION

3 credits

This course will look at God's mission and the biblical foundation for doing mission—including the nature and purpose of God, mission in the Old and New Testament, the essential missionary task, and the instruments of mission. We will also examine a number of contemporary models/paradigms/theologies of mission.

Prerequisite: TH 100 Introduction to Christian Theology

Note: Also available through Online Education.

TH 343 HISTORY OF CHRISTIAN THOUGHT I

3 credits

A study of the development of Christian theology from the early Church through to the Reformation. The course traces the historical factors that have been significant in the formulation of Christian doctrine with a view to contemporary relevance.

Prerequisite: TH 210 The God of the Gospel

Notes: 1) Offered on demand; 2) Also available through Online Education.

TH 344 HISTORY OF CHRISTIAN THOUGHT II

3 credits

A study of the development of Christian theology from the Reformation through to the present. The course traces the historical factors that have been significant in the formulation of Christian doctrines with a view to contemporary relevance.

Prerequisite: TH 210 The God of the Gospel

Note: Offered on demand.

TH 354 APOLOGETICS

3 credits

Deepens and expands the introduction to apologetics given in HF 111 Thinking and Writing. Examines various methodologies as well as objections and issues students are likely to encounter. Students gain familiarity with the evidences for the factuality of Christianity and learn how to refute non-Christian systems of thought. They are encouraged to develop a more incarnational (life-style) apologetic. *Prerequisite: TH 210 The God of the Gospel and either HF 110 Written Composition or HF 111 Thinking and Writing*

Notes: 1) Offered on demand; 2) Also available through Online Education.

WA WORSHIP ARTS

WA 101 INTRODUCTION TO WORSHIP LEADING

1 credit

Worship has been described as a multifaceted jewel. No matter what side from which the jewel is viewed, there is always something new to see, a new depth to experience. Individuals seeking to lead congregational worship have undertaken a fascinating and lifelong journey. What view does the worship leader have of the worship of the triune God? What part of worship is most familiar? What part is most challenging? This course seeks to introduce the student to the breadth and depth of topics that encompass worship leading and ministry.

Note: Bachelor of Arts in Ministry/Worship Leading and Music and Diploma in Music and Worship Arts students only.

WA 120 INTRODUCTION TO SONGWRITING

1 credi

This course will introduce you to the basics of how songwriting works and will cover the primary building blocks of lyrics, melody, harmony, and rhythm as well as song form. Students will have a chance to try their hand at songwriting in a safe and instructive environment. This course also explores questions such as: How a songwriter can influence culture? What are the functions of music in society?

Note: Bachelor of Arts in Ministry/Worship Leading and Music, Diploma in Music and Worship Arts, and Certificate in Musicianship students only.

WA 121 SONGWRITING 1

3 credits

In this course you will sharpen your lyric, harmony, and melody writing skills. You will learn tools and strategies to generate better ideas, develop them, and work with structure and form in order to build them into great songs. This course also explores questions such as: Where does inspiration come from and how we encourage creativity? What are the distinctions between writing for a church service and a community audience? How can we influence culture through songwriting? Students will have the experience of writing songs individually as well as co-writing.

Note: Diploma in Music and Worship Arts students only.

WA 122 SONGWRITING 2

3 credits

This course is a continuation of Songwriting 1, building on a foundation of fundamentals for all aspects of songwriting. We will dig deeper into the art & skill of writing lyrics, melody and harmony. Students will have the experience of writing songs individually as well as co-writing.

Prerequisite: WA 121 Songwriting 1

Note: Diploma in Music and Worship Arts students only.

WA 123 THE LANGUAGE OF MUSIC 1

1 credit

Introduction to the foundations of the language of music based on the three aspects: melody, harmony, and rhythm. This is an overview of the basics of reading and writing music, setting a foundation for writing songs, music charts and for self-publishing music via computer software.

Note: Bachelor of Arts in Ministry/Worship Leading and Music, Diploma in Music and Worship Arts, and Certificate in Musicianship students only.

WA 124 THE LANGUAGE OF MUSIC 2

1 credit

This course will be a continuation of the study of the foundations of the language of music based on the three aspects: melody, harmony and rhythm. This study will build on the basics of reading and writing music setting a foundation for writing songs and music charts. *Prerequisite: WA 123 The Language of Music 1*

Note: Bachelor of Arts in Ministry/Worship Leading and Music, Diploma in Music and Worship Arts, and Certificate in Musicianship students only.

WA 221 SONGWRITING 3

3 credits

This course is a continuation of Songwriting 2, building on a foundation of fundamentals for all aspects of songwriting. You will learn advanced tools and strategies to generate better ideas, develop them, and work with structure and form in order to build them into great songs. In this course we will particularly dig deeper into the art and skill of writing melodies and harmony exploring advanced techniques in both worlds as well as studying a unified theory of harmony and melody writing. In Songwriting 3 students will be working on writing and rewriting songs for their EP project applying the techniques learned in all three songwriting courses.

Prerequisite: WA 122 Songwriting 2

Note: Diploma in Music and Worship Arts students only.

WA 224 ARRANGING SONGS

2 credits

This course will cover basic concepts and techniques of arranging songs. Practically, students will apply these concepts and techniques to writing music charts for rhythm section, vocals, strings, woodwinds and horns. Students will be using music software (Sibelius, Finale, or Musescore) to create arrangements for song assignments as well as their own songs.

Note: Bachelor of Arts in Ministry/Worship Leading and Music and Diploma in Music and Worship Arts students only.

WA 227 RECORDING AND PRODUCING

1 credit

This course introduces students to basic audio recording, including digital recording, tracking and editing. There is an emphasis on critical listening and analysis, as well as discussion of music and musical form. We will also explore how to think critically about music from an artistic view as well as a Christian viewpoint.

Note: Bachelor of Arts in Ministry/Worship Leading and Music and Diploma in Music and Worship Arts students only.

WA 228 THE LANGUAGE OF MUSIC AND WRITING

1 credit

This course focuses on applying the foundations of melody, harmony, rhythm, dynamics, and articulation in creating melody and accompaniment, and short songs. Application to the writing of music in various structures and forms is emphasized.

Note: Bachelor of Arts in Ministry/Worship Leading and Music and Diploma in Music and Worship Arts students only.

WA 229 THE LANGUAGE OF MUSIC AND CHARTING

1 credit

Students will learn to create professional music charts using music manuscript and the Musescore music software. Basic foundations for writing arrangements of songs will also be introduced including the creation of different types of charts for a variety of styles and instrumentation. This course will be more project-based as students will work on charting their own songs as well as others that will be given for assignments giving them the opportunity to be self-publishers of their musical creations. Students will also practice transcribing melodies and chords as well as identifying intervals and cadences.

Prerequisite: WA 228 Language of Music and Writing

Note: Bachelor of Arts in Ministry/Worship Leading and Music and Diploma in Music and Worship Arts students only.

WA 232 HOW MUSICIANS WORK

2 credits

What is the mindset of a "working musician?" What are the essential marks of a musician who is in demand? How does a musician make a living and navigate the new music business realities? How does a musician, singer, artist and one who uses music in ministry best serve an audience? The beginning of a career can be very scary because we don't always know where or how we should start, especially when it seems necessary to wear so many hats to get things going. This course intends to give students very practical directions and tools in order to start their musical careers with confidence.

Prerequisite: HF 151 How Music Works

Note: Bachelor of Arts in Ministry/Worship Leading and Music and Diploma in Music and Worship Arts students only.

WA 235 MUSIC BUSINESS

3 credits

In this course students will have a chance to learn from several highly qualified professionals in the music industry. Students will learn how to select and hire a winning team of advisors and structure their commissions and fees; navigate the ins and outs of record deals, songwriting, publishing, and copyrights; maximize concert, touring, and merchandising deals; understand the digital streaming services; and how to take a comprehensive look at the rapidly transforming landscape of the music business as a whole.

Note: Diploma in Music and Worship Arts students only.

WA 252 THE STORY OF WORSHIP

3 credits

This course is designed to lead the student in a study of worship through the content of the Old Testament, New Testament, and early centuries of church history. The study will establish a foundation upon which the practices of worship will be discussed and valuated. Does God require humankind to approach him in a certain way? Major components of worship practices and their meaning comprise the study of biblical sources and early Christian history. Is it God's story we tell or is it our story to live?

WA 254 WORSHIP: SUBJECTS AND OBJECTS

3 credits

This course is designed to lead the student in a study of corporate worship through the content of gathered worship service activities. Not only are worship service components studied and reviewed, the delivery of the elements is also examined. Service parts such as sermon, communion, baptism, parent/child dedication, funeral, wedding, seasonal days, prayer, and Scripture reading will be examined. Students will be encouraged to consider their own service tradition and compare it with other forms in the Christian tradition. The course will involve the student in widening and deepening their perspective and understanding of the relationship between general worship design and the individual service elements. This understanding will contribute to the student's overall concept of the purpose of worship and the role of the worship leader/planner.

Note: Offered on alternate years.

WA 290/391/490 DIRECTED STUDY

2 or 3 credits

Guided independent study in which students design and carry out research or a project of their own choosing. Requirements will be set in accordance with the nature of the research or project, which must be approved by a faculty supervisor, the Dean, and the Registrar. *Prerequisite: Consent of supervisor, cumulative g.p.a. of at least 2.3, not on Academic Probation.*

WA 320 WORSHIP BY DESIGN

3 credits

The corporate worship service of a local, Christian congregation will be the focus of this course through exploring and studying a variety of worship service design methodologies where each method brings with it its own set of ideas and implications. Students will study the philosophical background of service design methodologies with the intention of using evaluative tools and methods to quantify the pros and cons of various service designs.

Prerequisite: WA 252 The Story of Worship

Note: Bachelor of Arts in Ministry/Worship Leading and Music students only.

WA 341 WORSHIP FX

2 credits

This course will explore two main components of media and technology as it pertains to worship in ministry application – theory and practice. In other words, *why* do we use media/technology in worship ministry and *how* is it used? Theological and philosophical discussion on the use of technology in the church will explore a variety of pastoral sensibilities and implications of the use of media/technology in worship ministry. Students will experience practical hands-on training in the major technologies used in many churches today such as lights, sound, video/projection and the software used in the design and delivery of corporate worship services.

Notes: 1) Bachelor of Arts in Ministry/Worship Leading and Music students only; 2) Offered on alternate years.

WA 354 WORSHIP AS SPIRITUAL FORMATION

3 credits

What is the relationship between worship and Christian formation? How is the Church leadership and congregants formed through week-by-week corporate worship services? Is this a missed category when thinking about how people are discipled in the Christian faith? An introduction to the use and meaning of rituals, symbols, and how people grow in faith will assist the student to begin the development of a philosophy of worship as Christian formation.

WA 373-74 EP PROJECT—PARTS 1 AND 2

4 credits total

Recording an EP is where the student does what songwriters, recording artists and songwriting worship leaders do in the real world: they make a record of their creative work. This course is that – recording the EP under the guidance of producers and recording engineers. The course is also about pulling together all the elements of a finished recording: pre-production, recording the various tracks, mixing, mastering and working with a photographer and graphic designer for the packaging (even digital only audio releases are paired with some sort of packaging design and artwork).

Note: Diploma in Music and Worship Arts students only.

WA 378 WORSHIP PRACTICUM

3 credits

This course is designed as an integrated practical work experience in cooperation with a local church in order to provide the student with a supervised and evaluated experience in active worship ministry by qualified field supervisors/trainers.

Note: Bachelor of Arts in Ministry/Worship Leading and Music students only.

YO YOUTH

YO 151 INTRODUCTION TO YOUTH MINISTRY

3 credits

An introduction to contemporary youth and pastoral ministry. Students will examine youth and church culture, various models of youth and pastoral ministry, the biblical and theological foundations for reaching and discipling today's youth and families as well as a short study on the history of youth ministry. The areas of programming, teaching, recruiting, volunteers, administration, developing relationships with students and families, and personal care in ministry will also be covered.

Notes: 1) Also available through Online Education; 2) students who have credit in PA 161 Introduction to Pastoral Ministry cannot take this class for credit.

YO 224 CREATIVE TEACHING METHODS

3 credits

This course examines the teaching methodology of Jesus in principles and practice for teachers of youth. Students will be introduced to curriculum design and teaching methods that will help them become more effective teachers. We will explore several teaching styles that bring lessons to life with feeling and impact.

Note: Also available through Online Education.

YO 290/391/490 DIRECTED STUDY

2 or 3 credits

Guided independent study in which students design and carry out research or a project of their own choosing. Requirements will be set in accordance with the nature of the research or project, which must be approved by a faculty supervisor, the Dean, and the Registrar. *Prerequisite: Consent of supervisor, cumulative g.p.a. of at least 2.3, not on Academic Probation.*

YO 313 YOUTH ISSUES AND CULTURE

3 credits

This course is designed to help the student gain an understanding of personal/relational issues and cultural influences faced by pre-teens and teens in today's world. Students will be better equipped to teach and counsel teens on the issues they face in life.

Prerequisite: YO 224 Creative Teaching Methods

Note: Offered in alternate years.

YO 314 YOUTH COMMUNICATIONS

3 credits

This course is an introduction to preaching and youth communication that covers the creation, development and execution of sermons. In this course, students will have the opportunity to deliver sermons in various settings, even on radio. It is founded on the belief that you learn public speaking through experiential learning.

Note: Students who have credit in PA 211 Passionate Preaching and Teaching cannot take this class for credit.

YO 346 EXPLORING STYLES AND PHILOSOPHIES OF YOUTH MINISTRY

3 credits

This course will examine various styles and philosophies of youth ministry along with a comprehensive tour of Alberta churches and parachurch organizations.

Prerequisite: Introduction to Youth Ministry

Notes: 1) Course additional fee will be \$500 to help cover the cost of fuel and transportation. Accommodation will be looked after; 2) Offered in alternate years; 3) Also available through Online Education.

YO 460 TOPICS IN YOUTH MINISTRY

3 credits

This course is designed as a capstone course to cover various topics found in the church and parachurch ministry. This course will look at current trends and issues as they relate to youth/pastoral ministry. Students will also assist in the research and presentation of course topics related to present and future ministry. IPSAT training will also be included as a core component in this course.

Prerequisite: YO 151 Introduction in Youth Ministry **Note:** Also available through Online Education.



ACADEMIC POLICIES

We have selected and condensed some of our undergraduate policies for this section. The complete Academic Guide for undergraduate students is here. The Handbook for graduate students is here.

DEFINITIONS

APPLE Credit: Credit granted through our Portfolio program for prior learning experience outside the classroom. APPLE = Assessment Program for Prior Learning Experience.

Auditing student: An enrolment status enabling a student to attend a class without doing course work and without credit.

Credit hour: The basic unit of academic credit. One credit hour represents thirteen 50-minute class periods. Each course is given a credit-hour value, and graduation on any program requires a minimum number of credit hours.

Cumulative g.p.a.: The grade point average for all of a student's academic work.

Full-time student: Students taking 12 or more credit hours in the Fall or Winter semester.

Grade point average (g.p.a.): The total grade points earned divided by the total number of credit hours taken.

Grade points: The numerical equivalent of a letter grade. The number of grade points earned in a course equals the course credit hours multiplied by the point value of the grade. For example, a C+ (2.3 point value) in a 3 credit hour course is worth 3 x 2.3 or 6.9 grade points.

Letter Grade: A letter indicating the instructor's evaluation of a student's achievement in a course.

Part-time student: A student who does not take enough hours to be full-time. Auditing students are not considered part-time students.

Prerequisite: A course students must take or skills they must have before they can take another course.

Transcript: An official copy of a student's permanent academic record, showing all courses taken and grades earned.

Transfer credit: Credit granted by one institution for work completed at another.

Undeclared student: A student taking courses but not planning to receive a certificate, diploma, or degree.

GRADUATION

Students meet the following requirements:

A. Academic

- 1. Completion of academic requirements on the academic program.
- 2. Minimum cumulative g.p.a. of 2.0 in studies completed through the College.
- 3. Completion through Prairie of at least 12 credit hours on one-year programs, 24 on two-year programs, and 30 on three and four-year programs. Credit hours not done under the College's supervision (e.g. APPLE credits, Internship validation), do not apply. Graduates of other schools completing a Prairie College degree must have at least 24 credit hours through Prairie.

B. Spiritual Formation

A personal testimony of faith in Christ is one of Prairie College's entrance requirements. Spiritual formation in the Christian life is an aspiration of and desired outcome for students during the College's educational process. The student will describe this spiritual growth process in a Spiritual Formation interview as described in section 2.3. The student must also be living out the commitments of the Community Covenant with integrity in order to graduate.

C. Other

Approval of the President and Board of Directors upon recommendation of the Faculty.

TRANSFER OF CREDITS TO PRAIRIE

Transfer credit is given for courses studied in other post-secondary institutions. Courses from a recognized post-secondary institution can be transferred if they are comparable to ones in our curriculum and the grade earned is C- or better.

PRIOR LEARNING EXPERIENCES

Through our Assessment Program for Prior Learning Experience (APPLE), we grant academic credit for learning students have gained outside the classroom. Credit is granted for a specific course if the course objectives have been fulfilled by other means, determined by evaluation of a learning portfolio submitted by the student. There is a fee for this service.

CREDIT LOADS

The Fall and Winter semesters are 15 weeks. Spring and Summer Sessions courses may vary. The maximum semester load for any student is 19.5 credit hours. (Students may request an exception by contacting the Registrar).

ACADEMIC ADVISING

An academic advisor helps students choose and schedule courses and gives them assistance in other areas pertaining to their academic endeavors at Prairie.

COURSE CHANGES

For the policy on making changes to a student's class schedule, see the current Academic Guide on our website here.

VIOLATION OF POLICIES

Students who violate academic policies or other regulations are liable to one or more of a number of penalties, ranging from denial of privileges to expulsion. A record of all serious violations is put into the student's file.

PROGRAM CHANGES

Students may change their academic program at any time for a charge of \$50. (The charge is waived for students in their first semester.)

REPEATING COURSES

Any course may be retaken, regardless of the grade earned. Only the higher grade will be used in computing the student's grade point average; however, the other grade still appears on the transcript.

ACADEMIC PROBATION AND SUSPENSION

Students will be placed on Academic Probation if they were enrolled in 6 credit hours or more in a semester (Fall or Winter) with a semester g.p.a. below 2.0.

The College makes special academic help available to students on probation; such students are also under certain restrictions. Students who fail to make satisfactory progress are subject to Academic Suspension (mandatory withdrawal from the College) for one or more years.
